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Course Description

The language teaching community agrees that learning language and culture are inextricably connected. Thus, this course focuses on developing students' Spanish- language proficiency through modes of communication that reflect real life communication in the varied cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. By employing interpersonal, interpretive and presentational communicative modes in Spanish, students will explore the ideas, values, beliefs and other cultural aspects of Spanish-speaking peoples across the world and how these aspects work together to affect human experience.

Skills and Outcomes

By the end of the course, students will have developed solid competencies in each of the five goal areas (the five C's): Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities. Main objectives include:

1. Ability to comprehend and respond to basic conversational patterns
2. Proficiency and knowledge of basic grammatical structures and terminologies
3. Basic proficiency in reading and writing the language
4. Knowledge of significant cultural practices and historical events from the Spanish-speaking world
5. Ability to use technology for e-mail and research of selected topics in Spanish

6. Ability to use the Supersite for oral and written practice of Spanish

Homework and Quizzes

Online homework and quizzes will be made from the [VHL Central Supersite](#) daily. These assignments include written, audio and video activities. Each assignment is to be completed by 11:59 p.m. on the due date. Homework completed after the deadline will not be accepted. Failure to turn in the homework on time will result in a grade of zero for the given assignment.

One or two “in class” quizzes will be given per chapter and you will have online quizzes as well. Graded homework and quizzes will constitute a total 25% to your final grade. No late work is accepted and no make-up quizzes are given. Your lowest homework grade and your lowest online quiz grade will be dropped at the end of the semester. There are no pop-quizzes in this class, but at the same time, there are no specific dates for quizzes, so be in class, and be informed.

Participation

Please note that participation contributes 20% towards the final grade in this course. Participation in class is mandatory. Your participation grade will be based on the “points system”. During the class you will do activities and exercises, individually or as a group. Each time your professor asks you a question based on these activities you should answer in Spanish for which you will receive a point. The professor will register the participation of chapters 1 and 2 individually and then she will register the participation every two chapters. You will have a total of four participation grades. Notice that you will have to speak Spanish during the class. Don’t worry about speaking perfect Spanish, accuracy will come with practice. There will be frequent group work for which the entire group will receive participation as well.

Absences and tardiness

Attendance in this class is mandatory, you are required to be in class for the entire period. Arrive on time. You will be counted absent if you miss more than 15 minutes of class time. You are allowed to miss 2 classes, in case of emergencies; after those, the professor can drop you from the class without further notification. Be aware, the more classes you miss the more your participation grade is affected, since you can't participate when you are in class. However, if you participate consistently in class, you can always catch up with the rest of the class.

Absences due to official university functions or documented illness will be dealt with on an individual basis and should be discussed with the instructor outside of class time. It is the student's responsibility to keep up with his/her own absences. There are no "excused" absences from regular class periods.

Language Laboratory

You will take a quiz based on videos you will have to watch at the World Languages Laboratory in Bea Wood 127. There are a total of six lab quizzes to complete, one for each chapter covered this semester. Please give your MSU Student ID to the lab attendant in order to receive your quiz. You will receive a quiz and a Scantron. You are not allowed to use books, notes, or any other materials when completing the quiz. Also, do not write on the quiz. Please sign out at the lab attendant's desk in order to retrieve your student id. Make-up and/or late quizzes are not permitted. Your lowest lab grade will be dropped at the end of the semester. Please note the due dates below. A schedule of lab hours will be posted on D2L as soon as it is available. You will do the lab at the end of each chapter.

Exams

There are three major exams, one every two chapters. Each exam consists of a multiple choice, matching, and/or true false portion and a written/short answer portion. Each major exam contributes 10% to the final course grade. You will be allowed 50 minutes for each major exam.

Final Exam

The comprehensive final exam covers all materials studied during the course. The exam consists of a multiple choice, matching, and/or true false portion and a written/short answer portion. The Final Exam contributes 15% to the final course grade. The Final Exam for this course is scheduled for Thursday, June 30 / 2:30pm – 3pm in PY203.

Make Up Work/Tests

There will be no makeup quizzes, make up exams, or make up homework. However, at the end of the semester, the lowest grade of online quizzes, labs, homework, will be dropped, and one Vhl participation will be dropped, one grade per category, except for in-class participation, in class quizzes, and Exams.
