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Course Description

The instructor has designed this course first and foremost with the intention of providing her students with a basic understanding of the themes and events that dominated the American past since the Civil War. For obvious reasons, she has not designed the course to be comprehensive, but rather foundational. It is a course from which further exploration of this nation's history may be launched. In addition to providing students with a broad knowledge of U.S. History, the course will help students critically analyze historical events. The course design also includes interpretive techniques to help students better understand what it is that historians do.

Quizzes

There will be a 10-question quiz each week. Questions are derived from your textbook *Give Me Liberty*. Students will take each quiz via D2L. The window to take each quiz opens every Thursday at 6:30 A.M. and closes each Friday at 11:30 P.M. Here are the instructions:

- 1. Log onto D2L.
- 2. Click on the 9-block square at the top of the page and find our class. Click on it.
- 3. Once you are on our classroom dashboard, click on "Assessments" near the top of the page.
- 4. Under the drop-down list, click on "Tests." You should see all the quizzes.
- 5. To take a certain quiz, click on the arrow next to it. Students will have 10 minutes to complete each quiz once they begin testing. Each question is worth 10 points.

Movie Assignment

You will write a 5-6-page essay on the movie *The Graduate* (1967). Further instructions are posted on D2L. To upload your movie assignment, log onto our classroom D2L dashboard, look under "Assessments" and then click "Assignments." You should see a dropbox entitled "The Graduate." You may submit your essay any time until 11:30 P.M. on the due date.

Exams

This course includes two exams, a midterm and a final, both of which will consist of 50 multiple-choice questions. Students will take these exams via D2L. The instructions are as follows:

- 1. Log onto D2L
- 2. Click on the 9-block square at the top of the page and find our class. Click on it.

- 3. Once you are on our classroom dashboard, click on "Assessments" near the top of the page.
- 4. Under the drop-down list, click on "Tests." You will see "Midterm" and "Final."
- 5. On the scheduled date, click on the arrow next to "Midterm" or "Final" to begin. You will have 90 minutes. Study guides are available under "Content."

Extra Credit

Virtual extra credit options, usually Zoom talks by academics, can be found under "Content" on our D2L classroom dashboard. Click on "Extra Credit" to see the options. You may attend one or all. Attending one of these talks will be considered a "Bonus Quiz." Essentially, your lowest quiz grade will be replaced with a 100. Note, Zoom informs the instructor what time you log into the meeting and what time you leave. To earn the extra credit, you must stay for the duration of the talk.

Make Up Work/Tests

Legitimate excuses are official university absences, illnesses, and/or close family deaths. Students must provide the necessary proof like university paperwork, doctor's excuses, or funeral remembrance cards. The acceptability of any other excuse is at the discretion of the instructor. If any such excuse is accepted, the instructor will take a letter grade off for every day a quiz, exam, or writing assignment is late.

Change of Schedule
