Course Description

The language teaching community agrees that learning language and culture are inextricably connected. Thus, this course focuses on developing students' Spanish- language proficiency through modes of communication that reflect real life communication in the varied cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. By employing interpersonal, interpretive and presentational communicative modes in Spanish, students will explore the ideas, values, beliefs and other cultural aspects of Spanish-speaking peoples across the world and how these aspects work together to affect human experience.

Skills and Outcomes

By the end of the course, students will have developed solid competencies in each of the five goal areas (the five C's): Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities. Main objectives include:

- 1. Ability to comprehend and respond to basic conversational patterns.
- 2. Proficiency and knowledge of basic grammatical structures and terminologies.
- 3. Basic proficiency in reading and writing the language.
- 4. Knowledge of significant cultural practices and historical events from the Spanish-speaking world
- 5. Intensive practice of different technologies like d2l, vhl, and zoom.

Required Course Materials

You will need the Vista Higher Learning (VHL) Aventuras, 6 th edition ISBN 978-1-54333-615-3 package with full VHL Central Supersite plus & WebSAM technology. It's the same book you used for Spanish I if you took the class at MSUTexas. If you don't have the book with the online access to

materials, you can purchase your book here: https://vistahigherlearning.com/store/school/midwesternstate

*Please check the 'Read Me First' section on d2l where you will find more information on how to purchase the materials if you don't have them yet. Since this course is online, I suggest for you to get the digital access only. At the moment of purchase, you will receive a code that you need to enter to access your online textbook and materials.

Instructor Class Policies

The following are rules you will need to take seriously in order to pass this class:

- 1. You are responsible for going over the section 'Read Me First' on d2l to understand how this course is going to work.
- 2. Any kind of **cheating**, **plagiarism**, **or collusion** will result in penalties going from zero for a particular activity to zero for the entire course. The decision is at the discretion of the professor: do not risk your grade!
- 3. **On d2l**, there are no make ups for any assignment, once the deadline has passed, d2l automatically will assign you a zero.
- 4. On VhI, you can submit late homework and quizzes up to three days late without a penalty, however, after the third day late your homework will not be accepted, and you will earn a zero for that activity.
- 5. There will be homework assigned for every day of the week, and the
 professor will do her best not to schedule homework during a weekend
 and/or during a break, but sometimes it would be unavoidable; so that you
 don't have an overcrowded week.
- 6. You are responsible for learning how to use the d2l and the vhl program by following your professor's instructions on the 'Read Me First' section, if you fail an assignment under the excuse that you didn't understand how the technology works, there will be nothing the professor can do to help you. If you have questions always contact her ahead of an exam or assignment due date, never on the day of the exam, because you are risking her not seeing your email on time.
- 7. This class covers one semester of content, prepare your homework and study daily if you want to be successful. The Final Exam is comprehensive; thus, it covers the content of the entire semester.
- 8. Your professor is willing to give you guidance if you are struggling with a particular topic, but she is not going to become your personal tutor throughout the semester. If you need constant assistance with your

- 9. You are responsible for checking d2l and Vhl daily for assignments and daily communications. You have chosen to take this course online, so please make sure you have a computer with a camera in place, with a microphone able to record, a speaker able to play sound, and a system that can carry d2l and zoom. Important to note that **Chromebooks** are **NOT** recommended for this course since they **are not** compatible with d2l.
- 10. In the eventuality of a campus closure due to inclement weather or any other unforeseen situation, students working online should continue to work online, unless there is a state or national emergency that disrupts internet service. Exceptions will be made in a reasonable manner according to individual situations.

Grading

Course Grade - Please, be aware that you are not allowed to use translation apps or any other kind of help to do ANY type of homework or exam. If your professor suspects you have cheated by using an app or asking for help to someone, she will grant you a zero for that assignment, and if the behavior persists, she will give you a zero for the course. If you challenge the professor's decision, you will have to prove in person via conversation and writing that you have the level of Spanish you claim and for which the professor will recommend you to take the proficiency exam instead of the class. Vhl Homework and Tutorials

You will have daily assignments from the VHL Central Supersite. This supersite is the one that comes with your textbook. Once you enter their online activities you will see they divide them in several sections:

Preparación: is the section for vocabulary, each chapter of the book comes with a vocabulary section (your book in the package is called vText, use it to study before you do the homework). Also, for homework a section title 'Tutorial' pertaining to vocabulary where you can practice pronunciation and memorization of words, will be assigned each chapter on vhl, there is nothing to do in these tutorials but to watch them as you were in the class watching your professor repeating vocabulary.

Pronunciación: is the section with some pronunciation activities.

Aventuras: this section is very important, it is a mini-series like a soap apera, and it comes with activities for after viewing each video.

Cultura: is a small reading about a cultural topic.

Flash Cultura: is a brief video about a cultural topic, different than the reading in the previous section.

Gramática: this section please study in the book. The book that comes with your vhl materials is called **vText**, but I have also prepared slides that I have posted under content on d2l. The grammar points are organized by chapters. We start the course with chapter 6, so the first grammar topic of chapter 6 is 6.1, the second one 6.2 and so forth. Each chapter has about two or three grammar topics.

On vhl you can find your homework under 'calendar' so you can see the amount of homework that has been assigned weekly.

Only for the homework you will have a chance to submit the same activity up to three times on the same day. That is, you will have up to three attempts to complete your homework correctly, but make sure you are completing the homework and not the guizzes. The guizzes will allow you only one attempt.

Vhl Quizzes / D2L Vocabulary Quizzes

On VhI (the online material that comes with the online textbook) you will have quizzes, besides the homework. You will find them the same way you find the

homework, but they will say quizzes. Make sure you have studied and done your homework to practice before you take these quizzes, because you only have one attempt at taking them, if you fail the quiz, you cannot re-take it, unlike the homework.

On d2I (the university platform where I post slides for you to study, quizzes, and exams that I design) you will always have a vocabulary quiz as well, the due date will be just right after you have completed your vocabulary practice on Vhl. These vocabulary quizzes will be designed by your professor, and will be true or false, multiple choice, matching, etc.

D2L Chapter Quizzes

These chapter quizzes will help you to review for the final exam: you will have one chapter quiz per chapter, then one Midterm Exam and then the Final Exam. You will have a total of five-chapter quizzes with a total value of 10 percent. The chapter quizzes will be extensive, they will cover vocabulary and grammar, and culture, they will have multiple choice, matching, true or false, fill in the blank activities, but also will have open questions and writing sentences.

D2L Speaking Practice

The speaking practice will take place on d2I, please make sure you have a good microphone to record, and it will be posted under assignments, you will be given a set of questions based on the Aventuras mini- series that is part of your VhI package. You will be assigned a video of the mini- series each chapter, for which you will have regular online homework; but also, the questions of the oral practice will be based on that miniseries video- chapter you see. There will be a total of four oral practices: some of the questions will be directly about the miniseries and other questions will be prompted by the mini-series and may be about you and things related to you.

Live Speaking Exams I and II

There will be two Speaking Exams via zoom individually with each student, one right before the Midterm Exam and one right before the Final Exam. You will receive the available times to schedule your appointment before the interviews take place. The questions for the interview will be similar to the ones asked in the practice, but not the same. Sometimes there will be similar topics, but different questions, for example. The meetings will be on zoom and you will find the zoom link on d2l under 'Content' when the time comes.

Writing Activities

At the end of each chapter, you will be asked to submit a small composition related to the content of each chapter. Students at this level will make mistakes and that is fine. If the professor finds the language and the grammar you use to be way more advanced than Elementary Spanish II, your professor may give you a zero for the activity under the suspicion you have used an app to translate/write your work. If you challenge the professor's decision, you will have to write a similar composition in front of her to demonstrate you have the level of Spanish you show in your work. Do not risk it!

Reflective Essay

Towards the end of the semester, you will write a personal reflective essay related to a sociocultural aspect. The cultural topic will present the student with an ethical dilemma or issue for resolution. Students should demonstrate that they have adequately researched and considered the topic in the framework of the core curriculum objectives. The essay will be written in English, and it will be an opinion type of essay of no more, but no less than three pages. It should be typed, and it should follow the guidelines given on d2l. The Personal Reflective Essay serves as an assessment of the student's performance of the core curriculum objectives in the specific context of this course. The essay will be due towards the end of the semester.

Midterm Exam

There is a Midterm exam that covers chapter 6 -8. You will be tested on vocabulary, grammar, writing and culture. Be careful not to use translation apps or any other type of help because if you are suspected of cheating, you may receive a zero for either the section of the exam where cheating is suspected or for the entire exam if the cheating seems pervasive. If you challenge the professor's decision, you will have to write in front of her similar activities than those on the exam to prove you really know the material.

Final Exam

The final exam is scheduled for Tuesday May 7th. From 10:30am to 12:30pm. There are no make-ups, and you will need to use lockdown browser with webcam proctoring. Unlike the previous exams, for the final exam you are assigned a specific day and time, make sure you mark your calendar because if you miss the exam you will receive a zero. You have the date and time in advance, plan ahead to avoid any problem. The final exam covers the content of chapters 6 to 11.1.

Extra Credit

There will not be opportunities offered for extra credit in this course; if at any point in the semester you are concerned about your performance in the class, please contact the professor as soon as possible to help you develop strategies to reach your goals.

Make up Work / Tests

There will be no makeup quizzes, make up exams, or make up homework. However, at the end of the semester, the lowest grade of Vhl quizzes and homework will be dropped.
