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Course Overview

This course discusses disease processes and concepts related to etiological considerations with emphasis on radiographic appearance and modification of exposure factors.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the students will:

- 1. Define terminology used in the study of disease
- 2. Describe the general principles and mechanisms of disease
- 3. Describe the common causes of disease
- 4. Identify common tests used to diagnose disease or injury
- 5. Identify and discuss radiographic pathology.

• Participation (15%)

Students must participate in class activities, projects, and discussions. Evidence of class participation includes: attendance, being on time, participating in class discussions, and submitting assignments on time. Each unexcused absence (see attendance) will be a 10 point deduction.

• Pathology Project (15%)

The purpose of this project is to reinforce the student's understanding of a pathologic condition and the medical imaging procedures used for diagnosing such pathology.

This project will be presented in class as a group presentation.
