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Course Description

This class will provide the students the tools and opportunity to improve their language skills through the review of important grammatical aspects of the Spanish language; thus, speaking and writing will be particularly important in the process of developing new abilities. At the same time, we will explore different aspects of the Spanish speaking cultures and societies. This is a hands-on interactive class, so attendance is fundamentally important in order to practice the target language and keep building vocabulary, and grammatical structures, in Spanish. The class will be conducted entirely in Spanish, but this should not intimidate students, since the interaction with peers, and the professor as well, will only be conducive to learning and improving one's knowledge and competency.

Participación en clase

In class we will read short texts, listen to monologues by native speakers, and watch short films; students will be asked questions, bot in writing and orally, in order to test their comprehension. Failing to answer the questions will affect the participation grade. When requiring oral participation, students are expected to raise their hand, in order to keep proper track of responses. Sometimes there will be group work, and participation will be graded as well.

Composiciones

During the semester students will write six compositions, one per each chapter of the book. Students will start the composition in class, and then finish it at home. Students will turn the composition in by the next class day, and the composition must be typed. The length will be usually a page or a page and a half, about 500 – 600 words.

Exámenes

At the middle and at the end of the semester, students will take two essay exams in which they will be asked to apply the knowledge acquired in class, particularly when it comes to grammar, vocabulary, and general writing abilities. The essays will be written in class, and the use of dictionary will not be allowed. A third exam will be given the last day of classes in the Language Laboratory, it will be an oral exam, students will be asked questions and they will record their answers.

Presentación oral

The first or second week of classes students will choose a particular topic related to the Spanish-speaking world; before the middle of the semester they should make an appointment to talk to the professor in her office, in order to evaluate the direction and depth of the student's research on such topic. Meeting spots will be given between February 6 and February 18. The professor will meet with each student individually. Students will prepare a presentation in order to show the findings of their research to the class. The presentation should be accompanied by PowerPoint slide show, but only images will be allowed, no text.

Pruebitas

The students will receive daily quizzes based on the grammar subjects and vocabulary studied in class. They will as well receive online sources in order to practice the grammar. The students are expected to go over the grammar topics and do the practice tests, as homework, using the links provided in the syllabus. All grammatical aspects are a review of what the student has learned during the first two years of Spanish. Students are not allowed to make-up quizzes, if a quiz is misses the student will receive a zero for that quiz, but at the end of the semester one quiz grade will be dropped.

Extra Credit

In order to obtain extra-credit, you will be asked to attend some University functions, particularly Spanish Club and cultural activities. Please understand that extra-credit is volunteered and not mandatory. There will be some opportunities to attend events; however, there is no such thing as making up extra credit despite personal conflicts you may have.

Make Up Work/Tests

There will be no makeup quizzes nor make up exams, you have received the examination dates in advanced, please, plan ahead. If you know you should miss an exam due to an official university function, please make arrangements with your instructor prior to the absence and as soon as possible. If you are absent from an exam or quiz, you must present documented proof of illness or university activity to your instructor before an early or make up exam will be scheduled. Be aware that scheduling a make up examination is up to the discretion of your professor.
