- 1. Read literature closely for literal and figurative meaning
- 2. Analyze the ways in which literature is intentional and form shapes meaning
- 3. Understand literature within its historical, social, economic, and political context
- 4. Join the scholarly dialogue about literature through acknowledging the ideas of others and situating your ideas within that dialogue both orally and in writing
- 5. Explore the significance of aesthetic reading and writing
- 6. Understand the work of professionals in literature studies
- 7. Understand connections among works across historical time periods and cultures

Grading Policies:

This class will not use the plus/minus grading system. In this class, the following numerical equivalents for final grades are used: A = 100-90%; B = 89-80%; C = 79-70%; D = 69-60%; F = 59-0%.

According to MSU's Undergraduate Catalog, "letter grades have the following significance:

- A indicates excellent work
- B indicates good work
- C indicates satisfactory work
- D indicates passing work
- F indicates failing work" (73).

Consequently, essays that meet the basic requirements earn a C, not an A or B. If you wish to earn As and Bs, you will have to work harder to produce better than satisfactory, or average, writing.
