Week 2 (40 points) Due Friday January 21
Read Chapter 1 Ethical Concepts in Sports
Read Chapter 2 Sportsmanship, Gamesmanship, and Cheating
Respond to the following questions:

- 1. Just because an act or decision is legal or in compliance with a rule does not necessarily make it ethical. Explain this concept and give examples.
- 2. The connection between athletes and fans should exemplify a collaborative model rather than an adversarial model. Explain this concept and give examples.
- 3. It has been argued that American sports are consumed with gamesmanship and that players rarely value sportsmanship. Explain this concept and give examples.
- 4. Is spying on another team always wrong? Why or why not? Give examples.

Read Case 4-5 Vendrell v. School District No. 26C, Malheur County
Respond to the 5 questions presented at the end of the case study.

Week 4 (60 points) Due Friday February 4

Read Case 6-4 State of Colorado v. Nathan Hall
Respond to the 3 questions presented at the end of the case study.
Read Case 6-7 Hackbart v. Cincinnati Bengals
Respond to the 3 questions presented at the end of the case study.

Week 5 (40 points) Due Friday February 11
Read Chapter 8 Ethical Considerations of Race in Sports
Read Case 8-4 Malcom v. Novato United States School District
Respond to the 4 questions presented at the end of the case study.

Week 6 (20 points) Due Friday February 18 Read Chapter 11 Ethical Considerations in Sports Media Respond to the following questions:

1. Should universities and high schools be able to limit and monitor what student-athletes post on social networking website? Why or why not?

2. Should the private lives of athletes, coaches and administrators be off-limits to reporters if their actions have nothing to do with the sport? Why or why not?

Week 7 (50 points) Due Friday February 25 Final Case Analysis

Complete the following case analysis and submit your analysis to the appropriate dropbox (Case Analysis). The case analysis is worth 50 points.

Research the current literature and select a case that is currently being litigated – meaning a case in which a decision has not yet been rendered. You are to write a 2-3 page paper that covers the items presented below. The paper is worth 50 points and will be graded using the attached rubric.

#### Paper Guidelines:

- 2-3 pages, no more than 3 pages and no less than 2 pages
- Use 12 point, Times New Roman font
- Set all margins at 1"
- Use double spacing throughout the paper
- Give your paper a title and include your name in the heading
- Check all grammar and punctuation
- Use your own words in the construction of the analysis

Expectations for Case Analysis (You MUST present information from steps 3-7 in your paper)

- 1. Read the case to get an overview of what is occurring.
- 2. Read the case a second time and make notes about the significant aspects—the individuals and their actions, circumstances surrounding the situation, and contributing factors.
- 3. Identify the central ethical/legal issues of the case and describe the issues succinctly.
- 4. Determine any areas of conflict or potential conflict as they relate to the central issues.
- 5. Identify the causal factors (any behavior, omission, or deficiency that if corrected, eliminated, or avoided probably would have prevented the situation) that could influence acting in an unethical/unlawful manner as they relate to the central issue.
- 6. Suggest courses of legal action for this case.
- 7. Describe the ramifications if your suggested actions are taken.
