COURSE DESCRIPTION

To study acting is to take life's experiences and reflect them through various characters on stage. It is a great form of expression. Live theatre sharpens your perceptions while enhancing your creative capabilities. You can reach your audience through storytelling, movement, music, and expression. Acting is not just for "theatre majors" or those students who want to develop a career in acting. Acting is for everyone!

COURSE OBJECTIVES

To provide the student, through participation and experience, with an understanding and appreciation of the arts and theatre. Students will:

-Learn to read and analyze plays

-Develop research skills necessary to create a character who may be from a different

time, place, culture, and lifestyle than the student

-Create and perform a character in a monologue and scene

-Develop oral and written critical skills for discussing performance

-Use constructive criticism to further develop an acting role

-Understand these basic acting principles and how to apply them to the student's choice of career or lifestyle

TEXTS:

No textbooks are required for this class. However, you will be expected to read two plays, as assigned. You will receive links to these as they become available.

Other materials:

Handouts provided by instructor

Monologues and scenes from scripts, provided by instructor and student

ATTENDANCE AND LATENESS:

This is a performance-based class. Attendance and punctuality are mandatory. The work of this course primarily happens during class time and cannot be made up privately. Tardiness is extremely disruptive and disrespectful to the creative process in an acting class. If you are absent or late, the following penalties apply,

This class is only once a week missing one class is like missing a week of classes.

Because this class is $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours long we will take a ten minute break in between. I will retake attendance after the break, absences and tardiness apply.

Attendance Penalty Scale Lateness

0 absences + 10 points

- 1 absence 0 points -Missing half of class is considered 1 absence
- 2 absences 5 points
- 3 absences 15 points
- 4 absences 25 points
- 5 absences -35 points etc.

Tardy 3 times (Up to five minutes) counts as one absence Tardy 2 Times (After five minutes) counts as one absence

If students are sick/quarantining, they can still receive class credit/attendance points by attending the synchronous class via Zoom. They will be required to be present, dressed, have their camera on during the whole class period, and to do all exercises. Students MUST arrange for online classes 24 hours in advance with their instructor. Classes will NOT be recorded for students to view at any time; the student must be present for the class period as scheduled by the university. The Zoom link for class attendance will be given when requested by the student.

I DO NOT accept late work. If you have an excused absence, the homework must be turned in via email the date and time it is due, NO exceptions. If you are set to perform on a day you are missing due to an excused absence, you must arrange an alternative before the due date. Instructor and scene partner must be informed in advance. As I don't live in Wichita Falls it is impossible to make up work during the week.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. PARTICIPATION: Daily participation in class activities and discussions. Have fun, be engaged and participate fully in order to begin to develop your imagination and gain insight about yourself. Dependable participation in scene, attending out of class rehearsal as needed.

2. READING: Completely read assigned plays and demonstrate analytical skills. The Instructor will place scripts on D2L. There might be quizzes on assigned reading.

3. PERFORMANCES: Prepare and present all performance projects, as assigned by the instructor. These include:

1. an Introduction performance project, as assigned by the instructor.

2. Memorize, rehearse, perform, and then, based on critique, revise and perform again two monologues (one comedy, one drama) and two scenes from a contemporary American play. You must submit a typed script analysis on performance day. No late script analysis will be accepted.

3. Monologues will be chosen by you, one comedy and one drama, not to exceed one minute. Scenes will be chosen by Instructor

GRADING: Grading will be out of a total of 1000 points, based on the course requirements outlined above. You could at any time calculate your grade if you are organized and keep all of your assignments (which is a GREAT idea!)

Breakdown is as follows:

- Introduction Performance Project 50 pts
- Monologue (comedy) two attempts 50 pts each = 100 pts

- Scene 2 performance two attempts 50 pts each = 100 pts
- Monologue and scene script analysis (4 total) 25 pts each = 100 pts
- Open Scene 50 pts
- Improv assignment 50 pts
- Meisner Scene 50 pts
- Final performance project 100 pts

GENERAL NOTES:

Cell Phones and Other Recording Devices
