Grading

Course Grade – Your grades in this course are based on this scale: A=100-90%; B=89-80%; C=79-70%; D=69-60%; F=59-0%. According to MSU's Undergraduate Catalogue, "letter grades have the following significance: A indicates excellent work, B indicates good work, C indicates satisfactory work, D indicates passing work, F indicates failing work" (73). Consequently, an essay that meets the basic requirements earns a C, not an A or B. If you wish to earn As and Bs, you will have to work hard to produce better than satisfactory, or average, writing.

Homework

Homework assignments are listed on the daily schedule along with their due dates. Homework is due at the beginning of class.

Participation

Participation is bringing your books, binder, and assignments to class. It is also taking part in individual work, group work, and workshops. Failing to work during class lowers your participation grade. You may raise your participation grade by attending an event sponsored by the English Department. See the classroom bulletin board.

Submission Format and Policy

Submit all writing assignments—paragraphs and essays, whether they are handwritten or typed—in MLA format. The guidelines are as follows:

- Double space.
- Maintain a one-inch margin around the text.
- Use a font of Times New Roman 12.
- Type or write on one side of the paper.
- Give the essay a title, centered. Do not use the thesis statement or question as a title.
- Indent each paragraph.
- Number each page in the header with your last name followed by a space in the upper right corner.
- List your first name, instructor's name, course and class number, and due date—day and then month and then year (no commas)—in the identification on the left.

Do not send assignments as email attachments. Submit all work during class time on the due date unless otherwise noted on the assignment sheet.

Note: you may not submit a paper for a grade in this class that already has been (or will be) submitted for a grade in another course, unless you obtain the explicit written permission of me and the other instructor involved in advanced.

By enrolling in this class, you expressly grant MSU a "limited right" in all intellectual property created by you for the purpose of this course. The "limited right" shall include but shall not be limited to the right to reproduce your work product in order to verify originality and authenticity and for educational purposes.

Unit Writing Assignments

This course is comprised of four units, A through D. Each unit contains a writing assignment that focuses on an element of effective writing: unity, development, coherence, or consistency. The bulk of each assignment will be completed during class workshops, though typing will be done outside class time. Each unit writing assignment is 10% of your total grade.

Unit Reading Assignments

Each unit contains a major reading assignment. You must annotate and write a paragraph summary. Reading assignments in *The Advanced Reading-Writing Connection* are followed by multiple-choice questions for you to answer. The class discussion of a reading assignment is part of your grade. The combined reading assignments are 20% of your total grade.

Grammar Quizzes

Grammar quizzes are 20% of your total grade. You will take 6 quizzes, and I will drop the lowest grade. These quizzes will be taken outside of class so that you can use your *English Essentials* textbook and learn the skills.

Extra Credit

I do not give extra credit assignments.

Late Work

The policy for submitting late work is as follows:

- I do not accept late homework, which consists of assignments from the textbooks.
- I do accept late grammar quizzes and writing assignments until the work has been graded and returned to the class.
- Late assignments earn a grade deduction of 10 points per weekday. So turn in work during my office hours to prevent excessive penalty.

Writing tutors will not edit your papers for you, but they will provide support and feedback at every stage of the writing process, from brainstorming to drafting, revising to proofreading.

In ENGL 0043 attendance is mandatory. You're allowed 3 absences. Your second absence results in a conversation with me. After your third you'll be contacted by an academic counselor. The fourth earns an F in the course and the lost opportunity to continue attending class. Don't miss out on an education due to absences.
