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Course Description

The instructor has designed this course first and foremost with the intention of providing her students with a basic understanding of the themes and events that dominated the American past since the Civil War. For obvious reasons, she has not designed the course to be in anyway comprehensive, but rather foundational. It is a course from which further exploration of this nation's history may be launched. In addition to providing students with a broad knowledge of US History, the course will help students critically analyze historical events. The course design also includes interpretive techniques to help students better understand what it is that historians do.

D2L

Weekly Quizzes

*There will be 14 weekly quizzes (based on the *Give Me Liberty* textbook). The window to take the quizzes opens on Thursday mornings at 6:30 A.M. and closes on Fridays at 11:30 P.M. The instructions are as follows:

1. Log onto D2L.
2. Click on the 9-block square at the top of the page and find our class. Click on it.
3. Once you are on our classroom dashboard, click on "Assessments" near the top of the page.
4. Under the drop-down list, click on "Tests." You will see all the quizzes.
5. To take a specific quiz, click on the arrow next to it. Students will have 10 minutes to complete each quiz once they begin testing. Each question is worth 10 points. The dates of the quizzes are noted in the schedule at the bottom of this syllabus.

Movie Assignments

*Students are expected to write a 5-6-page essay on *Bonnie & Clyde* (1967) and on *Pleasantville* (1998). Further instructions can be found on our class dashboard on D2L. Click on "Content," and then click on "Movie Assignment Instructions."

*The essays must be typed, in 12-point font, Times New Roman, and be double-spaced. The margins should be 1 inch on the top and bottom and 1.25 on the left and right.

*Submit your movie assignments via D2L. On our D2L class dashboard, click on "Assessments." Then click on "Assignments." You should see a folder entitled "Bonnie & Clyde" and one entitled "Pleasantville." You must submit by the designated due dates: February 21 and March 20.

Exams

*This course includes two exams, a midterm and a final, both of which will consist of 50 multiple choice questions. Study guides are posted on D2L.

*Students will take both exams on D2L.

*The instructions for taking the exams are as follows:

1. Log onto D2L
2. Click on the 9-block square at the top of the page and find our class. Click on it.
3. Once on our classroom dashboard, click on "Assessments" near the top of the page.
4. Under the drop-down list, click on "Tests." You will see "Midterm" and "Final."
5. On the scheduled date, click on the arrow next to either "Midterm" or "Final." Once you begin, you will have 60 minutes to complete the Midterm and 90 minutes to complete the final.

Extra Credit

*Virtual extra credit options, usually Zoom talks by academics, can be found under "Content" on our D2L classroom dashboard. Click on "Extra Credit" to see this semester's two options. You may attend one or both. Attending one of these zoom talks will be considered a "Bonus Quiz." As such, your lowest quiz will be replaced with a 100. Note that Zoom informs the instructor what time you log-in to the meeting and what time you leave. To earn the extra credit, you must stay for the duration of the talk.

Make Up Work/Exams

*If you fail to take an exam or quiz by the given deadline, you must provide a legitimate excuse as to why if you expect to make it up. Legitimate examples are family deaths and illnesses (documented by a doctor's excuse). Forgetting is not an acceptable excuse.

Midterm Progress Report

*To help students keep track of their progress toward course objectives, the instructor will provide a Midterm Progress Report. Midterm grades will not be reported on the students' transcript, nor will they be calculated in the cumulative GPA. They simply give students an idea where they stand at the midpoint of the semester. Students earning below a C at the midway point should schedule a zoom meeting with the instructor.
