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Course Description

This course offers private piano instruction, with weekly lessons and individualized repertoire. It allows students the opportunity to engage in the selection of pieces, ask questions, and grow as musicians and individuals. In order to get the most of the course, it is necessary to dedicate significant time to out-of-class practice and preparation.

Course Objectives

This is a private lesson with individualized objectives, although all students will work to develop both technical and artistic skills at the piano. Therefore, scales, technical exercises and etudes may be assigned in tandem with repertoire.

Homework

All homework will be in the form of pieces, exercises, and competencies assigned to students for practice outside of class. Practicing and demonstrating improvement is part of the final grade, so it's important to develop solid practice habits early. The instructor can help to organize a healthy practice schedule, if that is helpful.

Projects Required

All projects will be performance-based, such as pieces and technical exercises given for the student to practice. Part of the final grade is the preparation and performance of assigned pieces, which also ties in with weekly practice.

Final Exam

The final exam will be the semester jury. This is an opportunity for students to demonstrate what they have learned in front of a supportive and encouraging faculty, and will be worth 15% of the final grade.

In the jury, each student will perform two selections from the pieces, exercises, or scales they have worked on during the semester. The instructor and student will choose these selections together.

Instructor Class Policies

In order to get the most out of your lessons, it is necessary to put in a considerable amount of time outside of class. Daily practice is the foundation of musical progress, so make every effort to practice on a daily basis if at all possible. We will create your assignments and repertoire based upon the progress you make, so the more effort you put forth, the more exciting skills you can develop and the more fun pieces you can play!

Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.
