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Course Description

An introduction to the fundamentals of photography using a DSLR (digital single lens reflex) camera. This course includes digital camera use and basic image manipulation controls using Photoshop and Lightroom. Introductory lighting and artwork reproduction skills are taught. The aesthetics of photography will be discussed in terms of its history, and artistic and technical advancements. Students must own or have use of a DSLR camera.

This is a highly labor-intensive course that requires a great deal of time outside the regular class meeting hours. Students will be expected to shoot no less than 50 digital images per week. Ideally, students should allocate time every day to take photographs; learning a new language requires daily practice. Allow more time for to produce conceptually and technically considered images for critiques. In addition, technical failures are a necessary part of the learning process. Therefore, students must allow enough weekly outside lab time (be mindful of lab hours). **Students are expected to be creating new work every week; work made previous to this class is not allowed to be turned in for class assignments.**

Course Objectives - Students will:

- Demonstrate the ability to manipulate shutter speed, aperture, and other camera controls to correctly expose an image using the camera meter.
- Use image manipulation software to optimize image files for web and print purposes.
- Utilize a variety of lighting techniques to create intended expressive goals.
- Discuss the technical and aesthetic merits of imagery using professional critique vocabulary
- Identify key historic figures and technical developments in the history of the field.
- Develop an understanding of the elements of visual design such as composition; space, contrast and light through slide lectures of historical and contemporary photographic artworks and gain an awareness of the historical quest for color.

- You are expected to come to class prepared, having completed all reading assignments and arriving with any required materials. You must shoot outside of class time so that you edit, compile, print, mount, and organize your photos during class time. Use your class time wisely.
- Preparation for Critique: I highly recommend that you print at 1-2 days before critique. Printing
 is part of the process, not just the end point. Technology is fickle—printers jam, ink runs out, IT
 issues, etc.—please give yourself plenty of time to print. You must have your photos printed
 BEFORE the start of class. You will NOT be allowed to print during class on critique day.
- You are expected to contribute to critiques of the assignments and final projects, offering constructive criticism to their peers, and providing useful commentary about the work under discussion.
- Help each other, as you will learn as much from each other as you will learn from your instructor. I will do my best to create a safe, fun environment where you feel excited to make work.
- Disruptive and disrespectful behavior will not be tolerated. Tardiness is disruptive, so be on time.
- Be mindful of the lab schedule; you are NOT allowed to work in the lab during other classes (unless you have permission from that instructor in advance).
- Active participation and involvement during class includes:
 - Giving your full attention to instructor and classmates
 - Having an open-minded outlook
 - Participating in exercises and assignments
 - Giving feedback during discussions and critiques, verbal or written
- All work must be made specifically for this class during this semester. No previously taken
 photos may be used. Failure to do so will result in an "F."

Artificial Intelligence (AI): The use of generative AI tools (such as ChatGPT) is not permitted in this course; therefore, any use of AI tools for work in this class may be considered a violation of Texas Tech's Academic Integrity policy and the Student Code of Conduct since the work is not your own. The use of unauthorized AI tools will result in referral to the Office of Student Conduct.

Attendance

Regular and punctual attendance is required. You will be allowed 2 unexcused absences. Arriving 15 or more minutes late will equal an absence. Two late arrivals equal an absence. After 3 absences, the final letter grade is lowered one letter grade. 4 or more absences will result in a failing grade. Absences during critiques will not be tolerated. On critique days, a tardy will result in a reduction of one letter grade for the portfolio/assignment being critiqued; a tardy of more than fifteen minutes or an absence will result in a zero for the portfolio/assignment. Please contact your professor prior to missing class. Lectures and demonstrations are not repeated.

Assessment

Grading will be based on student engagement of the material (by way of Self-Evaluation) and conversation with the instructor. Self-Evaluation will be due after every critique (both small and large), mid-semester, and end of semester.

This course will focus on qualitative, not quantitative, assessment of your own work (something we'll discuss during the class). I will give you verbal and/or written feedback by asking questions and giving comments to engage your work on every assignment. The intention here is to help you focus on working in a more organic way, as opposed to working as you think you're expected to. If this process causes more anxiety than it alleviates, see me at any point to confer about your progress in the course to date. If you are worried about your grade, your best strategy should be to consistently work on your projects, join the discussions, do the reading, and give feedback to your classmates.

Class Policies and Grading

D2L will be used as the repository for class records. These include, syllabus, assignments, and lectures. You are expected to have the materials necessary for each class prior to class beginning and you are expected to have knowledge of your syllabus and the timeline of the course.

- Late assignments will NOT be accepted. All work is due on the assigned day.
- Grade percentages are determined according to the class requirements list. One grade based on a combination of craftsmanship and creativity is given for each critique.
- Withdrawals It is the responsibility of the student to properly withdraw.
- Point value/grade distribution: 100-90=A, 89-80=B, 79-70=C, 69-60=D, 59-0=F
- A grade of "Incomplete" is granted only with a written doctor's excuse or under emergency circumstances such as a death in the family.

Self-Evaluation

Self-Evaluation guides will be uploaded on D2L. The guides are meant to help you reflect on your performance.

<u>Small Critique:</u> Submit a Self-Evaluation before the end of class on the day of small critique. You will be given class time to complete your self-evaluation. Submit on D2L. I will meet with everyone individually to go over your evaluation and give feedback.

<u>Large Critique</u>: Submit a Self-Evaluation no more than 3 days after you present in large critique. Submit on D2L. I will meet with everyone individually to go over your evaluation and give feedback.

You are allowed to re-submit your project with a Self-Evaluation and meet with me as many times as needed. The only exception is the last project, which you will have only 1 week to resubmit due to time constraints.

Gallery Attendance

Students enrolled in studio or art history courses must attend every gallery opening and sign in at the reception desk. If the student cannot attend the gallery opening, they are required to write an exhibition review.

<u>Assignments</u>

1. Technical Assignments: Sept 26 (30% - 10% each)

You will be given three short assignments that are exercises designed to help you experience the concepts discussed during lectures with your camera. These assignments explore metering, shutter speed, depth of field, moving objects, camera movement and angle. Handouts will be provided.

2. What to Photograph? Oct 15 (10%)

Using your cell phone, create one photograph that responds to the prompts created in class. Images will be printed out for class discussion. Handouts will be provided.

3. Light and Shadow: Oct 29 (25%)

Each student is required to produce a body of work (8-10 images) using creative natural lighting techniques. Shoot at least 200 images, print 8.5 x11 or larger. Contact sheets required. 2 prints MUST be window mounted. Projects must be contained in a portfolio box.

4. Emulation: Dec 10 (25%)

Each student is required to produce a body of work (8-10 images) using creative natural lighting techniques. Shoot at least 200 images, print 8.5 x11 or larger. Contact sheets required. 2 prints MUST be window mounted. Projects must be contained in a portfolio box.

5. Digital Portfolio: Dec 12 (10%)

Each student is required to document all photographic works produced during this semester. Include the final images from each critique – Minimum 20 images. Upload images to D2L. Label images by project title. EX: L&S 1, L&S 2. Images should be no larger than 5MB and not smaller than 2MB.

All work must be in final presentation format at the time of the review.
