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### **Course Description**

This course is designed to give an introduction to the world history of art and visual culture. We will focus on the "means" of art, the way artists use visual language and communication, as well as the history and social functions of art in a variety of cultures. This course has no prerequisites and satisfies the requirement for a Core class fulfillment for Creative Arts.

### **Course Objectives**

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Identify the function of art in human society and describe the value of art as a cultural endeavor.
2. Define basic art terms, processes, and media, and identify design principles and elements in a range of artworks.
3. Recognize and describe key works, periods, and styles in art history.
4. Employ electronic tools and resources to research subjects in art.
5. Apply critical looking and thinking tools in studying artworks firsthand at a cultural institution.
6. Produce critical writing that includes description, analysis, interpretation, and evaluation of selected artworks.

### Tests (30%)

There will be five tests in this class based on slide information, lectures, and any other assigned materials. The tests consist of multiple-choice and short answer questions. A study guide will be provided two weeks before the test. These tests will take place within regular class hours without the assistance of notes, textbooks, or other materials. No make-up exams will be allowed without documentation from a doctor or academic authority. In this case, prior notice of any upcoming missed days is preferred.

### Assignments (20%)

Two written assignments will be assigned over the course of the semester. Detailed instructions and evaluation criteria will be provided in class at the time each assignment is introduced.

### D2L Discussions (15%)

Approximately every other week, students will respond to topics posted on D2L. As graded discussions, students are expected to make initial comments and reply to other students in the class. Each posting will have specific criteria.

### Paper (25%)

Your final paper will be an argument-driven essay that analyzes artworks using course vocabulary. More details will be provided later in the semester.

### Participation & Lectures (10%)

*Participation:* Active participation in lectures and discussions is expected, as it supports your understanding of key vocabulary, concepts, and topics. Your success in this course depends on consistent engagement in all activities. I will call on individual students to ensure broad participation and preparedness. If you can respond based on the day's material, you're meeting expectations; repeated inability to do so will lower your participation grade.

*Lectures:* Lectures will be delivered in class. Students are expected to complete the assigned readings prior to class, in order to deepen their understanding of lecture materials and prepare for inclass discussions. PDF copies of the slide lectures will be available on D2L after each class.

### Communication

I am always available to be reached by email, but I expect that you are respectful and professional in your communication.

Before you contact me, please ask yourself: *Have I first looked on D2L, in the syllabus, or reached out to a fellow student for assistance?*

If you have a private question, please contact me via email and I will respond within 24 hours on weekdays. Please do not expect a response over the weekend.

### Cell Phones, Laptop Computers, and Recording Devices

Cell phones must be silenced and put away completely out of sight and not looked at until class is over. If at any point your cell phone is not put away and silenced, you may be asked to leave for the remainder of the day. The use of cell phones and other recording or electronic devices is strictly prohibited during class, unless I explicitly direct their use for a class activity. Recording the class is prohibited.

Laptops/tablets: To support focus and discussion, I strongly recommend keeping laptops closed during lecture and conversation. You may use a laptop for note-taking or course tasks if it genuinely helps you, but please (1) sit near the back or side to minimize screen distraction for others, (2) turn off notifications and avoid non-class sites, and (3) close the device whenever we shift to group discussion or close looking. I may ask you to close a device if it's distracting. Students with documented accommodations are, of course, welcome to use approved devices.

### Artificial Intelligence (AI)

This course emphasizes the development of each student's own skills in visual analysis, critical thinking, and written communication. To ensure the integrity of your work and your growth as a writer and thinker, the use of artificial intelligence (AI) tools (such as ChatGPT, Claude, Gemini, or other text-generating software) to complete assignments, discussion posts, or exams is strictly prohibited. All written work must be your own.

Submitting AI-generated writing will be considered academic dishonesty and will be addressed in accordance with university policies. If you are unsure whether a particular tool is acceptable to use, please ask me before submitting your work.

### Attendance

Attendance in all classes is required, unless otherwise instructed. You are allowed two unexcused absences without it negatively affecting your grade. After two unexcused absences, your final grade will be lowered by  $\frac{1}{2}$  letter grade (5%) for each class meeting you miss.

A tardy is arriving 10 minutes after the beginning of class. Three tardies will constitute an unexcused absence. Leaving class before dismissal will constitute an unexcused absence, as well as arriving at least 30 minutes after class has started.

If you have an unexcused absence or arrive late to class, it is not the responsibility of the instructor to let you know what you missed. It is up to you to ask a classmate.

## **Change of Schedule**

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

## **Refund and Repayment Policy**

A student who withdraws or is administratively withdrawn from Midwestern State University (MSU) may be eligible to receive a refund for all or a portion of the tuition, fees and room/board charges that were paid to MSU for the semester. **HOWEVER**, if the student received financial aid (federal/state/institutional grants, loans and/or scholarships), all or a portion of the refund may be returned to the financial aid programs. As described below, two formulas (federal and state) exists in determining the amount of the refund. (Examples of each refund calculation will be made available upon request).

## **College Policies**

### Smoking/Tobacco Policy

College policy strictly prohibits the use of tobacco products in any building owned or operated by WATC. Adult students may smoke only in the outside designated-smoking areas at each location.

### Alcohol and Drug Policy

To comply with the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989 and subsequent amendments, students and employees of Midwestern State are informed that strictly enforced policies are in place which prohibits the unlawful possession, use or distribution of any illicit drugs, including alcohol, on university property or as part of any university-sponsored activity. Effective August 1, 2016, the Campus Carry law (Senate Bill 11) allows those licensed individuals to carry a concealed handgun in buildings on public university campuses, except in locations the University establishes has prohibited. The new Constitutional Carry law does not change this process. Concealed carry still requires a License to Carry permit, and openly carrying handguns is not allowed on college campuses.
