Course Description

An introduction to ceramic materials and techniques of hand building, decorating, glazing, loading and firing of kilns.

Course Objectives

1. Demonstrate an understanding of equipment safety and possible health hazards associated with ceramics
2. Maintain a clean working environment
3. Describe, recognize and utilize ceramic tools
4. Use surface treatment and decoration on ceramic surfaces
5. Demonstrate knowledge of kiln firings to include oxidation and reduction (atmospheric) methods
6. Demonstrate the procedure for loading and firing kilns: glaze and bisque
7. Demonstrate intermediate wheel techniques
8. Demonstrate intermediate glazing and surface decorating methods
9. Demonstrate glaze mixing by mixing one class glaze

Grading

Since ceramic work has two stages of completion, you will be graded on turning your completed green or leather hard work in on time, and you will be graded on your glazed work at the end of the semester. I will be grading your work with rubrics designed for specific assignments.

As art is subjective, I will be grading your assignments with some of the following criteria (depending on the assignment). Again. **It is your responsibility to show me each assignment as it is completed:**

1. Is it **innovative/experimental/ambitious/creative/original**: were you self-motivated?
2. Does it accomplish the assignment?
3. Does it **communicate** your intention/content?
4. Is it aesthetically pleasing . . . and designed well?
5. Did you use excellent Craftpersonship?
6. Did you give adequate attention to detail(s)?
7. Is there evidence of technical proficiency?
8. Is there growth in your work? Is there evidence of progression in your work?
9. Did you challenge yourself?
10. Did you consider historical ceramic imagery and reference images in your work?
11. Is there a sketchbook entry with a written journal, and glaze application for each piece?

Attendance

Studio Etiquette:

- There will be one mandatory all studio clean-up in the middle of the semester and the final clean-up on **Tuesday, December 9 at 9:30 AM . . . this is the final cleanup, if you miss the cleanup, you will lose one letter grade from your final grade!**
- During the semester, everyone will be asked to help maintain the studio
- **Please turn all cell phones to silent while in the ceramic studio . . . this includes texting ******
- **Music:** Please respect everyone in the studio when playing your music on the Ion Speaker. If someone asks you to turn it down or change the music, please do so.

If you are sick . . . stay home. But try to Zoom/Facetime the class. You have to do this in a timely manner. Do not ask to Zoom unless you give me at least 30 minutes notice.

1. **Some materials in the studio are toxic. If you are uncertain of the nature of a material, PLEASE SEE ME and/or see the Material Safety Data Sheets in the folder by the front door.**
2. Students are expected to take the utmost care in working with kilns and all power equipment. **Do not use any equipment, including kilns, without being properly trained and signing a training document.**
3. **Always** wear a respirator and rubber gloves when working with any toxic materials.
4. **Always** wear a respirator when sanding ceramic material and spraying glaze.
5. **Always** sand ceramic material outside
6. A list of all materials used in this studio is available in the yellow folder next to the front door.
7. **TAKING THIS COURSE IN THE ART DEPARTMENT AT MSU MEANS THAT YOU ASSUME RESPONSIBILITY to use all equipment, tools, and materials related to the course in a safe and responsible manner. If you have any health-related problems that would be adversely affected by taking the course, you should consult with me at the end of the first day of the class.**
8. Please tell me about any accidents, no matter how small.
9. Respirator: It is recommended that you buy a respirator. This is not mandatory. These are available at Lowes, Home Depot, or Granger – make sure it is good for dust (they usually have a magenta (pink) color on the filter and are generally labeled P100 filters): Approximately \$30. A N95 dust mask is the other option. **You must have an N95 dust mask OR respirator for this class!!**

4. [metal scraper](#) (KT S10 – steel scraper with serrations) Again . . . **please do not buy another “option”**

6. combination lock (if you would like to use a locker)

This syllabus may be changed to best meet your needs, or for other reasons as I see fit. This includes the changing or deleting of assignments. If for some reason the assignments administered total something other than 700 points, the method of obtaining the final grade will remain essentially the same: the total points achieved will be divided by the total points possible to obtain a percentage and a grade will be assigned according to the percentage scale outlined above.

Departmental Policy for Gallery Openings

- Students enrolled in studio or art history courses must attend every gallery opening.
- If the student cannot attend the gallery opening, they must meet following requirements:
 1. The student must write a paper on the artist exhibited in the Juanita Harvey gallery.
 2. The paper should emphasize the student's reaction to the work.
 3. The paper must be formatted in Times New Roman, 12pt font, and be double-spaced.
 4. The paper must consist of 500 words.
 5. The paper must be submitted to the art office **one week** after the exhibition opening.
 6. If the exhibition extends past the final class day of the semester, the paper will be due one week before the final class day of the semester.
- If a student does not attend the show nor submit a paper, their final grade will be dropped 3.3% per gallery opening.
- If a student misses all of the gallery openings and does not write a paper for each required exhibition, the student's final grade will be dropped by 10%.

Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

Refund and Repayment Policy
