Course Description

"A House Divided Cannot Stand,"—Abraham Lincoln. This course will trace the origins of the Civil War, the war's course, and the Reconstruction Era. Spanning from the 1840s to 1877, its intent is to provide students with contextualization, specifically as it relates to race, class, and gender. Themes include slavery, sectionalism, disunion, and emancipation. By semester's end, students will have a firm grasp of the roots of secession; war as it pertained to the soldier and the civilian; war's social, economic, and legal ramifications; the limitations of Reconstruction; and the Civil War in American memory.

Exams

Book Reviews

*Students will be expected to select two books from a list of approved options (posted on D2L) and writing a book review on each.

*The book review must be typed, in 12-point font, Times New Roman, and double spaced. The margins should be 1 inch on the top and bottom and 1.25 inches on the left and right. Your name, the title of this class, and the date should be in the top right-hand corner of the first page. Failure to adhere to the font, spacing, margins, and name/class/date being in the top-right corner will result in point deductions. There is no need for a title page.

*Much like with the aforementioned exams, you will upload your book reviews into a D2L dropbox.

Movie Critiques

*Students are expected to write two critiques of movies chosen from an instructor-approved list provided on D2L.

*The movie critique must be typed, in 12-point font, Times New Roman and double spaced. The margins should be 1 inch on the top and bottom and 1.25 on the left and right. Your name, the title of this class, and the date should be in the top right-hand corner. Failure to adhere to the font, spacing, margins, and name/class/date being in the top-right corner will result in point deductions. There is no need for a title page.

Discussion Leader

*Each student will lead discussion ONE week of the semester. See D2L for further instructions.

Term Paper

*Graduate students will be expected to write a 10-15-page term paper on a subject of their choice. When it comes to citations, use Chicago Manual of Style. You can find a brief guide at the following website: <u>Notes and Bibliography Style</u> (chicagomanualofstyle.org)

Extra Credit

*No extra credit assignments will be accepted, but bonus points <u>may</u> be offered for attending instructor-specified events on campus.

Make Up Work/Tests

Midterm Progress Report

In order to help students to keep track of their progress toward course objectives, the instructor for this class will provide a Midterm Progress Report. They simply give students an idea of where they stand at the midpoint of the semester. Students earning below a C at the midway point should schedule a meeting with the instructor.
