Grading

This class will not use the plus/minus grading system. In this class, the following numerical equivalents for final grades are used: A = 100-90%; B = 89-80%; C = 79-70%; D = 69-60%; F = 59-0. Letter grades have the following significance: A indicates excellent work, B indicates good work, C indicates satisfactory work, D indicates passing work, F indicates failing work. Consequently, an essay that meets the basic requirements earns a C, not an A or B. If you wish to earn As and Bs, you will have to work hard to produce better than satisfactory, or average, writing.

Use of AI (ChatGPT, Grammarly, etc.) is forbidden. I want to know what you think, not what a machine says. Because AI-generated work is clearly plagiarized, an AI submission will earn a zero for that assignment.

Essays

Because use of AI is so rampant, essays for this class will be extemporaneously composed in class.

Class Participation

For most classes, you will be assigned a question to answer in order to facilitate this class's collective conversation. For Tuesday's class, you will post your response to our D2L Discussion Board. On Thursdays, you will need to bring a hard copy of your answer. Twenty percent of your semester grade is based on these responses. (These also have a hard deadline. You cannot make them up.)

Midterm Grades

In order to help you keep track of your progress toward course objectives, the instructor provides a Midterm Progress Report through Navigate. Your Midterm grade is not reported on your transcript, nor is it calculated in your cumulative GPA. It simply gives you an idea of where you stand at the midpoint of the semester. If you are not doing satisfactory work at the midway point you should make an appointment with the instructor and consider visiting TASP.

The new Constitutional Carry law does not change this process. Concealed carry still requires a License to Carry permit, and openly carrying handguns is not allowed on college campuses.
