Overview:

This course is designed to go over the history of America up to 1865. In this course, students will examine the history of colonial America and the United States to the end of the Civil War. Some themes that will be discussed include the early Americans, colonization, the Revolutionary Era, the Constitution, Manifest Destiny, Sectionalism/Slavery, the Trail of Tears, and the Civil War. This class is divided into three sections: Colonialism to the Revolution; the Revolution to the Jacksonian Era; the Jacksonian Era to the Civil War. At the end of the semester, students will be able to look at the significant historical events in chronological order and analyze their causes and effects.

Objectives:

- Examine the historical events—and their causes and effects— that have shaped the United States until 1865.
- Analyze how culture, land, language, and identity motivated exploration, settlement, war, and treaties.
- Develop writing skills by summarizing your ideas, forming a thesis and supporting said thesis with evidence from the textbook and primary sources.

Required Texts:

- 1. Locke and Wright, eds., The American Yawp, Vol 1: To 1877.
 - a. This textbook is available online for free at https://www.americanyawp.com/. This online textbook provides the textbook chapters for the course. You do NOT need to purchase a physical textbook. There is also a PDF available online for e-Readers.
- 2. The American Yawp Reader
 - a. This primary source reader is available online for free at https://www.americanyawp.com/reader.html. This online reader provides the primary sources for the course.

Assignments:

- 1. Syllabus Quiz: 2%
 - a. You will take a syllabus quiz the first week of class. It covers the materials found on the syllabus. You are welcome to consult the syllabus as you take it.
- 2. Three 2-Page Discussion Papers: 18%
 - a. More detail about the layout and requirement of these papers are in the **Discussion Papers** section.

- 3. Attendance and Participation: 10%
 - a. You are responsible for material presented in lectures (PowerPoints) and in the readings; knowledge of both will be necessary for papers and the final exam. For this online class, your attendance and participation are calculated based on 6 reading quizzes and instructional viewing. D2L tracks when you access an activity and for how long. Do all activities/view all necessary PowerPoints, links, videos, etc. to achieve a perfect score.
- 4. Three Exams: 70%
 - a. You will take **3 exams** during the semester. Each exam will consist of **48 multiple choice and 2 short answers**. Before each exam, you will receive a series of possible question themes that you should spend time researching/preparing. You will be required to answer the short answers in paragraph form. Your final exam will be given during MSU Texas' finals week on D2L.

Discussion Papers

Students will be graded on three Discussion Papers that are no more than two pages. Not completing these Discussion Papers will negatively affect the overall grade. More detailed instructions will be posted separately under the Syllabus section on D2L.

- You are to pick **one topic** that has been discussed in lectures prior to the paper being due and write about **why it happened, how people felt about it, who was involved,** etc. You are to use your textbook and any primary source listed in the course schedule to back up your argument.
- Papers are due at the time indicated on D2L and in the syllabus. Papers must be submitted to D2L through the dropbox feature on the day and time indicated on the syllabus.
- Late discussion papers policy: Late discussion papers will not be graded.
- Papers need to be typed with 12 pt font, Times New Roman double-spaced, and have one-inch margins. At the top of the paper, you need to include your name, class, instructor's name, and date in a single spaced format. Please proofread these papers for mistakes and errors.

Other Policies

- No late papers.
- All assignments are to be submitted in Dropbox when they are due. The only accepted formats are PDF and Microsoft Word.
- Work outside of school, extracurricular activities, and having a number of assignments due in the same week or on the same day are not acceptable reasons for handing work in late.
- DEATH OF IMMEDIATE FAMILY MEMBERS, WITH DOCUMENTATION, WILL BE APPROVED. ILLNESS MUST HAVE DOCTOR'S NOTE in order to make-up assignments but this is still up to the discretion of the professor.

SECOND TIME WILL BE A 0/ZERO on the assignment, FAIL CLASS, AND REPORT TO STUDENT LIFE. This also applies to any work done with ANY AI tools. Turnitin runs your assignments through AI and plagiarism detectors, so DO NOT use AI in your assignments. If the LMS detects 33% of your Discussion Paper is generated by AI, you will automatically get an F on the assignment. LAST SEMESTER SEVERAL ONLINE STUDENTS WERE CAUGHT FOR PLAGIARISM AND CHEATING ON THE EXAM.

Refund and Repayment Policy
