The focus of this course is to review the etiology, pathology, pathophysiology, clinical features, and treatments for common pulmonary diseases in the adult and pediatric populations.

# Chapter Review and Quizzes

This course is a review of various respiratory pathologies in the adult and pediatric populations. Skim the chapters included in the course content section and select 12 chapters of interest. The student will read the chapter selected along with the power point presentations and take the chapter quiz associated with the chapter. This will be a self-paced course, but it is suggested that the student complete approximately three chapters per week.

# Chapter Quizzes

- 1. All students will complete Chapters 10, 11, and 12 by September 8th.
- 2. In addition to these, each student must select twelve (12) chapters from the text that interest you.
- 3. Submit a list of these additional twelve chapters to the instructor via D2L <u>under Survey in the Assessment tab</u>, by September 7th.

Requested quizzes will be made available under the assessment icon for each student. You may use your resources while taking your quizzes. <u>Please note</u> that selected quizzes must be manually opened by the professor and will be done so after the submission deadline.

Research Article Review and/or Actual Case Report Select a topic relating to a disease/condition covered in the text.

# You have two options for this assignment:

- 1. Write an actual case study related to a disease/condition of your choosing.
  - a. The case study can be one you found online or from your professional practice (no patient identification please)
  - b. Focus on patient assessment, therapeutic interventions, care plan and management of the disease/condition.
  - c. Discuss whether the patient was or was not managed according to published standards (evidence based practice).

Or

- 2. Write a research article review from current peer-reviewed article(s) related to the disease/condition you chose.
  - a. A research article review is <u>NOT</u> a report about a disease. It is a review of a research article or multiple articles relating to the disease. This may include, for example, new treatments, controversial therapies, advances in diagnostics, etc.
  - b. The article(s) should be current (last 5 years) and peer-reviewed.

References: Within the report cite at least 3 current (last five years) peer-reviewed research articles that focus on the topic of your report. These sources should correlate with your subject content. Please do not hesitate to utilize additional sources as well.

The report is to be APA format, word processed utilizing a font no greater than 12 with 1-inch margins and double-spaced with page numbers.

The amount of student written material (excluding the Title Page and References) must total at least 5 pages or if choosing to present in Power Point must total 20 slides (excluding title and reference slide). You will be graded on overall coverage of the subject and readability of the report. Points will be deducted for spelling and grammar.

# Reports should be submitted under the assignment drop box and are due no later than October 12th.

Extra credit will not be granted in this course.

Late Work

# Change of Schedule
