<u>Course Objectives:</u> This course in intended to be an introduction to the process of critical thinking, and the application of this method to some of the more interesting and controversial topics in psychology.

<u>Course Description:</u> Material will be presented in the form of class lectures and video presentations. While this course is basically a lecture course, it is necessary that students read material ahead and be prepared to engage in meaningful class discussion. Class lectures will be related to, but not identical with, material presented in the text, and you will be tested on both; therefore, regular class attendance is required.

There will be two papers required in this class. The first involves finding an article - from a newspaper, magazine, on-line source, etc. - then evaluating it from a critical thinking perspective. In other words, identify the internal and/or external influences that could be expected to distort your perceptions and/or influence your behavior. This paper is due no later than 3/10/22. The second paper will involve a critique of an article, on-line source, etc. that addresses some type of pseudoscience or aspect of the science and practice of psychology. The second paper is due no later than 4/21/22; late papers will result in a penalty of one letter grade per day.

There will be four exams, including the final. Exams will consist of short answer/essay questions.
