Text: Youth and the Juvenile Justice System: 2022 National Report

Class Description:

(Catalog) Credit 3 semester hours. Theoretical perspectives regarding the creation of childhood as a social construct and the etiology of juvenile offending. Particular attention is paid to the role of family, peers, and school.

Course Objective:

This course aims to provide the student with an understanding of the current juvenile offender issues. Major topics include juvenile victims, juvenile offenders, juvenile justice process, juvenile justice agencies (police, court, and correction) and juvenile offenders. Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- Identify the causation variables of delinquent acts.
- Examine the current situation on juvenile delinquency.
- Examine the current situation on juvenile victims.
- Employ sound programs of justice for juvenile delinquents.
- Construct sound arguments to evaluate decisions and actions in the juvenile justice system.

The above objectives are to be achieved through a process involving readings, class discussions and independent research.

Course Format:

The class is 100% online; there are no class meetings. All homework, assignments, and examinations are to be completed online no later than the final due dates for each assignment stated in the course schedule. If you have questions regarding the reading materials, quizzes, and exams, you have to post your questions each week in the D2L forum. If you would like to chat live on the phone with me, you can do so during my office hours by using Zoom. You can download Zoom at https://msutexas-edu.zoom.us/. Note: Meetings, official university business, and other situations may necessitate a change in or cancellation of office hours. I will e-mail you through the school account. Therefore, it's your responsibility to check your school account and log in to the class regularly.

Course Requirements:

- 1) Introduction: Due the internet course format, the personal introduction is intended to help students get acquainted with each other. The student's introduction should include information that the student is willing to share about him or herself, for example hometown, major, classification, your goal or objective of life. You are encouraged to upload a photo and keep it on your profile. After you introduce yourself in the forum each of you has a responsibility to post and welcome each other to this online class.
- **2) Forum Discussion:** Each student is required to post one initial comment and question related to our weekly reading assignment. The initial post needs to be 300 words or more. A minimum of two answering posts to your classmates questions are required. Each answering post needs to be 150 words or more and should include information that helps to enhance the discussion on the topic. Do not only include statements such as "great work", or "excellent post". Try to include information that is challenging yet respectful and that stimulates debate. Also, be mindful of including references and citations whenever citing facts to support your position. Use at least one scholarly source in your reply. APA 6th edition citations and references must be used... always!

Initial Post Due: Thursday 12 Midnight EST

Feedback Posts Due: Sunday 12 Midnight EST

- **3) Assignment:** Each chapter students must submit a two page, single-spaced summary on our reading material.
- 4) **Paper:** A research paper on an APPROVED topic on juvenile offenders: the work must be original. The paper should be approximately 10 pages in length and should address a specific crime or set of crimes, or a specific type of offender or offenders. Students are required to follow the American Psychological Association Writing

Guidelines which are most comprehensively covered in the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association 6th. Ed.,* although condensed and simplified versions of the APA formatting a referencing requirements may be found on-line and in other writing manuals.

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all meetings of the classes in which they are enrolled. Although in general students are graded on intellectual effort and performance rather than attendance, absences may lower the student's grade where class attendance and class participation are deemed essential by the faculty member. In those classes where attendance is considered as part of the grade, the instructor should so inform students

of the specifics in writing at the beginning of the semester in a syllabus or separate attendance policy statement. An instructor who has an attendance policy must keep records on a daily basis. The instructor must give the student a verbal or written warning prior to being dropped from the class. Instructor's records will stand as evidence of absences. A student with excessive absences may be dropped from a course by the instructor. Contact your instructor immediately upon having computer trouble If you have technical difficulties in the course, there is also a student helpdesk available to you. Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

Refund and Repayment Policy

A student who withdraws or is administratively withdrawn from Midwestern State University (MSU) may be eligible to receive a refund for all or a portion of the tuition, fees and room/board charges that were paid to MSU for the semester.
