COURSE DESCRIPTION: To study dialects is to take previous principles of diction, voice development, vocal variety and expressiveness and perform them through a filter reflecting different nationalities. This helps aid in more realistic character creation and performance. Through physical exercises and text work, students will develop an awareness of how to apply appropriate substitutions, sound placements, resonance, and intention to perform various dialects in spoken English language. This class will also focus on various aspects of using the voice effectively, including volume and projection, rate and phrasing, and inflection. We will extensively study the International Phonetic Alphabet to help aide in any future dialect work.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: To provide the student, through participation and experience, with an understanding of proper vocal control and IPA. Students will:

- -Learn (or remember skills using) the International Phonetic Alphabet
- -Develop vocal skills necessary to create a character who may speak with a different resonance, style, culture, or dialect than the student
- -Explore five dialects in both written dialogue and through performance projects
- -Explore exercises to enhance diction and clarity regardless of what dialect is being performed
- -Understand these basic principles and how to apply them in future instances that may require dialect

Stage Dialects. Jerry Blunt (the book, NOT the CDs)

These will be needed for transcriptions. YOU CAN NOT DO THIS CLASS WITHOUT BOTH OF THESE TEXTS. You will also be expected to find your own performance material, as assigned by the instructor. You will receive guidance to finding material and may need to purchase/find plays if their content interests you.

ATTENDANCE AND LATENESS: This is a performance-based class. Attendance and punctuality are mandatory. The work of this course primarily happens during class time and cannot be made up privately. Tardiness is extremely disruptive and disrespectful to the creative process in an acting class. If you are absent or late, the following penalties apply.

If students are sick/quarantining, they can still receive class credit/attendance points by attending the synchronous class via Zoom. They will be required to be present, dressed, have their camera on during the whole class period, and to do all exercises. Students MUST arrange for online classes 24 hours in advance with their instructor. Classes will NOT be recorded for students to view at any time; the student must be present for the class period as scheduled by the university. The Zoom link for class attendance will be given when requested by the student.

I DO NOT accept late work. If you have an excused absence, the homework must be turned in via email the date and time it is due, NO exceptions. If you are set to perform on a day you are missing due to an excused absence, you must exchange with a peer and it must be preapproved BEFORE the day of performance.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. PARTICIPATION: Daily participation in class activities and discussions. Have fun, be engaged and prepare fully in order to begin to develop your imagination and gain insight about yourself. Dependable out of class rehearsal as needed.
- 2. READING: Completely read any assigned bookwork or worksheets as assigned by professor. Learn the International Phonetic Alphabet and work to finesse written skills. You will have (at minimum) 8 IPA transcriptions throughout the course of the semester. If quarantining, these transcriptions can be turned in via email by the student, but they will need to be scanned and attached. Students will need a scanner/scanning app in order to submit all transcriptions. The instructor recommends Faster Scan by ifunplay. All scanned quizzes/tests will need to be in a pdf format.
- 3. PRODUCTIONS: View 2 Midwestern plays *Art* and *Big Fish* and write a critique. These will be based on acting critique guidelines provided by the instructor. These must be TYPED, EDITED and 2 pages in length in Standard English with an introduction and conclusion. Failure to see a required play will result in a 100 point penalty. Your ticket is free to both of these shows with your validated Midwestern Student ID. Seating will be limited for these productions, please ensure you reserve your tickets early.
- 4. PERFORMANCES: Prepare and present five dialect performances, as assigned by the instructor. More information about these performances will be made available as they occur

throughout the course layout.

A list of suggested material will be provided by the instructor, you may choose a role and monologue or one will be assigned. The instructor will provide any script analysis questions if needed.

Prepare and present a Final production performance that showcases one of the learned dialects. More details will be given halfway through the semester and will give the student ample time to prepare for the performance.

5. EXAMS: There will be an initial IPA exam, and a final IPA exam with dialect substitutions. More specific information will be distributed close to the times of exams. If quarantining, quizzes may be submitted in real time by the student through the use of their webcam and scanning software.

GRADING: Grading will be out of a total of 1000 points, based on the course requirements outlined above. You could at any time calculate your grade if you are organized and keep all of your assignments (which is a GREAT idea!)

GENERAL NOTES:
