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Course Description

This course explores contemporary and theoretical frameworks related to digital literacy. The course focus is on skills, trends, ethics, and societal issues to use technology to find, use, and share information. Students will use and assess online tools such as Google Apps, social media, and multimedia in an instructional setting including online instruction, professional development, or training in a variety of contexts (e.g. education, corporate, or health sciences).

Students will explore and recommend technology apps appropriate to various constructs of learning.

Students will use and assess available learning applications for training and education environments.

Explain and describe the legal and ethical implications of digital citizenship

Research, write, and present social media policies for institutions of education and corporations.
