# **Course Description**

Drawing I focuses on a variety of subjects in both wet and dry media with emphasis on black and white visual organization and expression. This is a foundations level studio course, introducing basic approaches to drawing and a variety of media, methods, and subject matter. This course will include lectures, demonstrations, slide presentations, studio and outside of

class drawing, sketching, reading, discussions, critiques, and writing, although the primary activity will be drawing from observation.

# **Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes/Course Competencies**

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will have gained a basic understanding and appreciation from the drawing discipline and its applications. Students will have obtained an understanding of vocabulary terms applicable to drawing and the arts and the means to apply them through discussion and critique. Students will also have further developed their drawing skills and increased their knowledge and understanding of drawing through a variety of approaches, materials, and techniques.

### Homework

Homework will consist of the following: sketchbooks, research, and other assignments that could not be finished during class hours. Please keep up with D2L and daily announcements in class for the updates on out of class work. Students should create a studio environment in which to execute homework, this will be discussed in the course and information will be on D2L. If a space such as this is unavailable, students are always welcome to use the drawing studios. (They should refer to the posted class schedules to know the class times they need to work around.) Working outside of class is an essential factor in successful completion of this course.

#### **Sketchbooks**

Students are expected to maintain a sketchbook specific to this class. There will be required work to be completed within the sketchbook, but mainly, students are expected to work independently in their sketchbooks (thumbnail sketches, studies, gestures, more complete drawings, notes, planning out projects, etc.) Please do not tear pages out of your sketchbook – undesired ends and failures are necessary in all processes, and they should be preserved the same as desirable outcomes and successes. Students should expect to spend 6 hours per week on homework.

### **Projects Required**

Studio projects and exercises: 6 major projects along with smaller exercises will be completed over the semester. Drawing I will consist of observational drawing, use of photographs, reproductions of art, and other materials. Students must complete all assigned work for a completed grade and under the instructor's advisement, and project guidelines, otherwise it will be a 0.

For in-process critiques and critiques of projects, work must be completed to the amount necessary. For critiques for finished works, only finished works can be reviewed. Students should never miss a critique day; 10% deduction to project will occur.

#### Extra Credit

Extra credit is not given in this course.

#### Late Work

All work must be turned in on time. D2L will have the open dates, due dates, and end dates for all student work.

All work must be completed within the time period allotted. There will be due dates for sketchbooks, research, in-class work and if not completed in time will result in grade deductions. Late projects will have a 25% deduction per class day late. If any work is late, only with permission can it be worked on during next class sessions.

For in-process critiques and critiques, work must be completed to the amount necessary. For critiques for finished works, only finished works can be reviewed. Students should never miss a critique day; deductions of points will occur.

Instructor will use discretion on opening closed student work and will discuss this as a caseby-case basis for each student request. If requests are repeated and continual, students maybe advised to drop course.

#### **Attendance**

Students are expected to attend all meetings of the classes in which they are enrolled. Although in general students are graded on intellectual effort and performance rather than attendance, absences may lower the student's grade where class attendance and class participation are deemed essential by the faculty member. In those classes where attendance is

considered as part of the grade, the instructor should so inform students of the specifics in writing at the beginning of the semester in a syllabus or separate attendance policy statement. An instructor who has an attendance policy must keep records on a daily basis. The instructor must give the student a verbal or written warning prior to being dropped from the class. Instructor's records will stand as evidence of absences. A student with excessive absences may be dropped from a course by the instructor. Students enrolled in the Juanita and Ralph Harvey School of Visual Arts must comply with the following department-wide attendance, absence and lateness policy:

- 1. Students arriving ten minutes after class begins (or leave early) will be considered late and will be counted absent.
- 2. THREE late arrivals (or early leave) count as a single absence.
- 3. Students may be absent from class THREE times without penalty and without providing any documentation regarding the absence.
- 4. If students incur a FOURTH absences, their final course grade will be reduced by a full letter grade.
- 5. If students are absent or late FIVE times, whatever the reason, they will receive a failing grade, can be dropped from the class roll, and be asked to stop attended class.

Students must be on time in the class and prepared with the proper materials or will be considered absent.

Cell phones, laptops, and headphones/media sets must be off or silent. Only use during class breaks or when necessary for coursework.

Students must respect each other, the staff and faculty, by not causing distractions in the classroom. If the disruptions are problematic, they are to be addressed by either intervening or asking the student to leave (this will be counted as an absence).

Regular online activity is required also. Students must contact the instructor as soon as possible if there are any emergencies or issues that will influence class performance. Please follow Student Handbook guidelines to follow appropriate measures.

An instructor may send Early Alerts through D2L to a student and their advisor about the following issues: student absent for more than three days in class, student offline for more than 5 days in a row, missing assignments or lack of progression and communication, not obtaining or using class materials, behavioral issues, or plagiarism. If 3 Early Alerts are sent, and no student progression is made, Instructor will perform an Instructor Withdrawal to drop the student from the course.

Faculty members have the discretion to make exceptions to this policy based on individual circumstances.

### **Change of Schedule**

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees.
