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
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Instructor Response Policy

Course Description

This course provides a comprehensive overview of health, safety, and nutrition practices and policies in early care and preschool programs.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes/Course Competencies

- 1. Identify and demonstrate understanding of safe and healthful environments that provide appropriate and well-maintained indoor and outdoor physical environments, including facilities, equipment, and materials to facilitate child and staff learning and development (NAEYC 1, 2, 5, 6).
- 2. Identify, explain, and demonstrate issues related to maintaining healthful environments that support the health of children and staff (NAEYC 1, 2, 5, 6).
- 3. Identify, explain, and demonstrate an understanding of program development that promotes nutrition and health of children and protects children and staff from illnesses (NAEYC 1, 2, 5, 6).
- 4. Identify, explain, and demonstrate an understanding of best practices for promoting health of children and staff including plans and policies for immunizations, communicable diseases, CPR, first-aid training, as well as standards for diapering, handwashing, proper positioning for sleeping infants/toddlers, feeding, water play, dispensing medication, and using health professionals (NAEYC 1, 2, 5, 6).
- 5. Identify, explain, and demonstrate an understanding of children's nutrition including food- serving practices, menus, health requirements, refrigeration requirements, and food allergies (NAEYC 1, 2, 5, 6).
- 6. Explain, identify, and demonstrate understanding of Texas state law and licensing regulations related to preschool and early care settings including foodhandling, child-staff ratios, CPR, first-aid and safety.

Weekly Learning Experiences

Weekly learning experiences (WLEs) will provide opportunities for students to interact demonstrating the depth of learning required for understanding the concepts found in this course. The learning experiences will include, but will not be limited to discussion boards, videos, individual or group products, and reflective essays. The WLEs will be due on Sunday evenings by 11:59 PM unless noted differently in the assignment due date schedule.

Window Notes

A Window Note is a tool you may use to reflect on and dig deeper into the readings associated with each textbook chapter we will explore during this course. The tool is a research-based strategy and will help you to walk away with a clear, conceptual, and applied meaning in a real-world context. During this course you will complete a Window Notes template for 4 textbook chapters you find most interesting. Your efforts are assessed by a rubric. The template is found in the D2L Important Course Materials-Note Taking section. The window notes will be due on Sunday evenings by 11:59 PM unless noted differently in the assignment due date schedule.

Quizzes

Content quizzes will be given through D2L. The quizzes will be aligned to important content from specified chapters or explored concepts and ideas. The quizzes will open at the beginning of the course and are due the Sunday by 11:59 PM of the assigned week. This means each student has the assigned week to complete the 50-point quiz. Each quiz will consist of multiple-choice items and be timed based on the number of items. You will have 2 opportunities to successfully complete each quiz demonstrating your understanding of key concepts and ideas.

Creative Assignment – Infomercial Promoting Wellness for Young Children The infomercial creative product will demonstrate the students' understanding of the health, safety, and nutrition practices and policies in early care and preschool programs. Students may work individually or in pairs producing the informercial. Delivery of the infomercial will include both written and video components outlining important health, safety, and nutrition practices and policies supporting their program/school/classroom/facility. The informercial will be due at the end of the semester and uploaded through D2L

Extra Mile Effort Points

Each week throughout the course the professor will offer assignments for students to earn extra mile effort points. These assignments will be offered at the professor's discretion and are not required to be completed by the student. The assignments will vary on point total while the total for all will not exceed 100 points. The students will submit responses through D2L, Google, or other formats based upon the intent of the assignment. When these assignments are offered, each will be due by Sunday of that the corresponding week at 11:59 PM unless additional time is needed to complete the effort.

Mid-Term Exam

There will not be a mid-term exam for this course.

Final Exam

There will not be a final exam for this course.

Extra Credit

Extra credit assignments will not be provided in this course.

Late Work

Late work will generally not be accepted. At times extenuating events occur and require grace to be extended by the professor regarding a specific due date or time. The determination on whether to accept late work will be determined by the professor. If a late work pattern emerges then the student and professor will meet via Zoom to discuss ramifications of not completing work in a timely manner. Ramifications may include reduction in assignment scores and/or course grades.

Make Up Work/Tests

Weekly course learning assignments will generally not be made up. At times extenuating events occur and require grace to be extended by the professor regarding a specific due date or time. The determination on whether to allow work and/or tests to be made up will be determined by the professor. If a pattern or poor performance emerges, the student and professor will meet via Zoom to discuss ramifications of not completing assignments and/or tests. Ramifications may include reduction of assignment scores and/or course grades or any efforts on learning assignments or test efforts receiving 0 points.

AI / Chat GPT

Since writing, analytical, and critical thinking skills are part of the learning outcomes of this course, all writing assignments should be prepared by the student. Developing strong competencies in this area will prepare you for a competitive workplace. Therefore, AI-generated submissions are not permitted and will be treated as plagiarism.

You may type a question into ChatGPT, however, you may not exactly copy and paste its response, and turn it in as your own. If you use ChatGPT, you must disclose this somewhere in your assignment. If you use ChatGPT or any AI, please use it in ways that are ethical, accurate, and useful.
