Course Description

This is an introductory course to macroeconomics. This specific branch of economics focuses on studying an economy as a whole, that is, in the aggregate. This includes learning about how and why an economy grows, why recessions occur, what are the causes and consequences of inflation and unemployment, and international trade.

Expected Learning Outcomes

By the end of the semester, students should be able to:

- Effectively communicate and analyze the applications of macroeconomic
- theory and policies that are related to regional, national, and/or global economic issues.
- Understand the importance of global factors in the performance of US and other foreign economies.

Homework

Homework assignments will be given <u>after the completion of each chapter</u>. All questions are solvable based on the lectures. Students are required to submit the assignments before the due date. *Homework is always due at the beginning of class.* On the homework review day, the instructor may ask each student to volunteer and explain how to solve problems on behalf of their colleagues. This is to develop the problem-solving and presentation skills as well as to practically review how much the students are understanding the materials. <u>A bonus point will be earned accordingly</u>. *No late submission is accepted*.

Exams

The exams must be taken as scheduled. **All exams are online and will be monitored through RESPONDUS LOCKDOWN BROWSER, which will require students to have access to a video webcam.** Every student is expected to have access to a webcam from the beginning of the semester. However, these monitoring tools are not compatible with Chromebook Laptop, Phones and Tablets. Contact <u>MSU Distance Education</u> to get proper instructions to execute this.

There are no make-up exams in this course and students missing an exam without a valid excuse will receive an exam grade of zero for the specific exam. A valid excuse is defined as an authorized absence (see Midwestern State University Undergraduate Catalog for the definition) or such event deemed acceptable by the instructor. *No make-up exams are given for the unexcused missed exams*.

There are four exams (and no cumulative final). On the exam day, the students will have access to complete the exam on D2L from 10:00 a.m. to 11:59 p.m. The students have 50 minutes to complete the exam at one sitting within this certain time limit. The exam dates are noted in the Tentative Course Schedule in this syllabus. However, the instructor can change the exam dates if necessary. Any changes in those dates will be announced in advance and posted prominently on D2L as well as being announced in class.

Late Work

If students miss an exam or assignment without prior approval from the instructor, *a make-up exam or late submission of work is not allowed*. However, for those who have missed homework submission and got a zero grade, I may give you <u>a grace period at the end of the semester</u>, but only 50% of the points will be counted. This will be announced accordingly right before the final week. *Please do not email the instructor about this make-up work before then*. Most importantly, this opportunity will be given solely based on your instructor's decision. If the instructor thinks this grace period is not a well-deserved opportunity to this class, the opportunity will not be given.

Attendance

The new Constitutional Carry law does not change this process. Concealed carry still requires a License-to-carry permit, and openly carrying handguns is not allowed on college campuses.
