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Course Description

Macroeconomic analysis is studied to identify forces affecting the economy's aggregate performance and to present theory useful in policy developments to achieve society's economic goals.

Expected Learning Outcomes

By the end of the semester, students should be able to:

- Use factual knowledge about macroeconomic terminology, methods, and trends.
- Understand basic economic principles necessary for thinking critically about the economizing problem, specific macroeconomic issues, and policy alternatives.
- Understand how to apply economic principles in the contexts of business, government, politics, and society.
- Recognize the importance of private and public economic decisions.

Homework

Homework assignments will be given <u>after the completion of each chapter</u>. All questions are solvable based on the lectures. Students are required to <u>submit the assignments before</u> the due date.

On the homework review day, this class requires each student to explain how to solve the homework problems on behalf of their colleagues. This is to develop the problem-solving and presentation skills as well as to practically review how much the students are understanding the materials. **No late submission is accepted.**

Exams

The exams must be taken as scheduled. There are no make-up exams in this course and students missing an exam without a valid excuse will receive an exam grade of zero for the specific exam. A valid excuse is defined as an authorized absence (see Midwestern State University Undergraduate Catalog for the definition) or an unforeseeable, proved, and documented event that requires the student's presence in a place other than the classroom during the class period, and such event is deemed acceptable by the instructor. **No make-up exams are given for the unexcused missed exams.**

Mid-Term Exam

There are two mid-term exams, which will be held during the regular class hours. The exam dates are noted in the Tentative Course Schedule in this syllabus. However, the instructor can change the exam dates if necessary. Any changes in those dates will be announced in advance and posted prominently on D2L as well as being announced in class.

Final Exam

Following the university schedule, the final exam will be held on Wednesday, May 8 from 3:30 to 5:30pm.

Late Work

If students miss an exam or assignment without prior approval from the instructor, a makeup exam or late submission of work is not allowed.

However, for those who have missed homework submission and got a zero grade, I may give you a grace period at the end of the semester, but only 50% of the points will be counted. This will be announced accordingly right before the final week.

Most importantly, this opportunity will be given solely based on your instructor's decision. If the instructor thinks this grace period is not a well-deserved opportunity to this class, the opportunity will not be given.

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all meetings of the classes given the university attendance policy. This class allows students up to <u>one</u> unexcused absence. In this case, you do not have to notify the instructor about your absence. For an excused absence, the document justifying the absence must be submitted to the instructor beforehand or within one week from the absence. <u>Instructor's records will stand as evidence of absences.</u> A student with excessive absences may be dropped from a course by the instructor.

As a matter of courtesy, do not leave lecture early without prior approval. Leaving class early, without prior approval, can result in an absence. To avoid disturbing the class, you are not to walk in and out of the classroom during class except for an emergency.

I may consider your tendency of class participation in favor of a better grade if you only miss a higher score by a narrow margin. If you have any concerns or excuses during the semester, please let your instructor know.
