Objectives and Outcomes:

1. Students can identify a researchable problem in their professional practice; then design, and implement an action research project to improve their practice.

2. Students understand and design informed consent to protect human subjects. Students can analyze their data and derive empirical findings that inform their practice.
3. Students can effectively use APA (6th Edition) to format their research paper and bibliographic guide.

Dispositions

1. Students will apply sound theory and methodology in research design.
2. As reflective practitioners, students will make professional decisions based on empirical data and sound scientific research.
3. Students will understand and protect the rights of participants involved in research.
4. Students will be critical and scholarly in their use of published research to define issues and resolve problems in education.

Content and methodological standards for this course are held by West College of Education, American Educational Research Association, and the Midwestern State University Graduate Catalog.

Ethical standards are those required by HSRC/OHRP. Manuscript style is set by the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association, 6th Edition. The primary measure of those standards is the student's written research report.

File submission – format and filename

Every time you submit your file in D2L, your format for doing so should be exactly in the following format:

Name of the Assignment Your First Name Your Last Name

Example: If your first name is John, the last name is Adams and you are submitting the assignment named "Research Purpose Statement" in dropbox, then the name of your file should be

Research Purpose Statement John Adams

Your file should be a word file by default. If you need to submit your file in any other format, contact me and let me know about it. There are chances

that you may have to use open document or any other file type depending on various programs that you use in your computer. You **MUST** discuss this situation with me before submitting your file in any format other than a word file, so that I will be ready with the software for reading your assignment.

Research Paper Requirements for this class

1. There should be more than 10 references
2. The paper should be in APA 6th style
3. The rubric that will be used to evaluate your paper will be discussed in class. You should fulfill all the requirements of the rubric to score well in your research paper.
4. You should also submit a presentation video in addition to your research paper.
5. The due dates and the time line of the research outlined in this syllabus is tentative and will change to meet to your individual research needs.
6. If you plan to graduate this semester, it is important that you meet with your academic advisor to determine the research standards according to your degree plan, at the earliest. There are different requirements to be met regarding your research paper based on your degree plans and discipline of studies.

Late Submissions in D2L

Lateness of the submission will be determined by D2L. I will not overrun the lateness recorded by D2L. Please understand that D2L does not take into account for holidays or weekends and so do I. For example, if the due date of a particular assignment were 11:30 pm, 8/27/17, and you submitted the assignment at 11:31 pm, 8/27/17, the D2L dropbox will mark your assignment as ONE day late. I will go by the D2L decision and will consider your assignment as ONE day late. To avoid missing the due date by such hairline margins, I advise you to submit the assignment well ahead. One day late will result in 10% drop in your earned grade. Two days late will result in 20% drop in your earned grade. And so on.

Blank submissions or submitting wrong files in D2L.

Extreme care should be taken when you submit your final document. If by any chance you submit wrong file, make sure to submit the correct one as early as possible. All the dropboxes are set to accept multiple files. I will evaluate the file that you submitted. If I have to notify you that you submitted the wrong file, and allow you to resubmit it, your grade will be 75% if the resubmission is within the date I would specify in the feedback.

Reading feedback for your assignments.

It is crucial that you read the feedback for your assignments. In order to encourage you to read the feedback, I intend to give credits for doing so on certain assignments. The feedback will have instructions to improve your understanding of the topics that we discuss in our class, in addition to pointing out the mistakes in the submitted assignments.
