Course Description

The language teaching community agrees that learning language and culture are inextricably connected. Thus, this course focuses on developing students' Spanish- language proficiency through modes of communication that reflect real life communication in the varied cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. By employing interpersonal, interpretive and presentational communicative modes in Spanish, students will explore the ideas, values, beliefs and other cultural aspects of Spanish-speaking peoples across the world and how these aspects work together to affect human experience.

Skills and Outcomes

By the end of the course, students will have developed solid competencies in each of the five goal areas (the five C's): Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities. Main objectives include:

1. Ability to comprehend and respond to basic conversational patterns

2. Proficiency and knowledge of basic grammatical structures and terminologies

3. Basic proficiency in reading and writing the language

4. Knowledge of significant cultural practices and historical events from the Spanish-speaking world

5. Ability to use technology for e-mail and research of selected topics in Spanish

- 6. Ability to use the Supersite for oral and written practice of Spanish Textbook & Instructional Materials

Homework and Quizzes

Online homework and quizzes will be made from the <u>VHL Central Supersite</u> daily. These assignments include written, audio and video activities. Each assignment is to be completed by 11:59 p.m. on the due date. Homework completed after the deadline will not be accepted. Failure to turn in the homework on time will result in a penalty of up to zero for the given assignment.

One or two "in class" quizzes will be given per chapter and you will have online quizzes as well. Graded homework and quizzes will constitute a total 25% of your final grade. No late work is accepted and no make-up quizzes are given. Your lowest homework grade and your lowest online quiz grade will be dropped at the end of the semester. There are no pop-quizzes in this class, but at the same time, there are no specific set dates for quizzes, so be in class, and be informed.

Participation

Please note that participation contributes 15% towards the final grade in this course. Participation in class is mandatory. Your participation grade will be based on the "points system". During the class you will do activities and exercises, individually or as a group. Each time your professor asks you a question based on these activities you should answer in Spanish for which you will receive a point. The professor will register the participation of chapters 1 and 2 individually and then she will register the participation every two chapters. You will have a total of four participation grades. Notice that you will have to speak Spanish during the class; your Spanish doesn't have to be perfect, accuracy will come with practice. There will be frequent

group work for which the entire group will receive participation as well. Please be aware that no participation grade will be dropped and that attendance is essential for participation, if you are not in class, you can't earn points.

Exams

There are three major exams, one every two chapters. Each exam consists of a multiple choice, matching, and/or true false portion and a written/short answer portion. Each major exam contributes 10% to the final course grade. You will be allowed 50 minutes for each major exam.

Final Exam

The comprehensive final exam covers all materials studied during the course. The exam consists of a multiple choice, matching, and/or true false portion and a written/short answer portion. It's exactly the same format of the three previous exams. The Final Exam contributes 15% to the final course grade. The Final Exam for this course is scheduled for Saturday, December 3rd. from 10:30am to 12:30pm.

Extra Credit

In order to obtain extra-credit, you will be asked to attend some University functions, please understand that extra-credit is volunteered and not mandatory. There will be some opportunities for extra-credit; however, if your working schedule or other personal conflicts interfere with the suggested activity, you can't, under any circumstance, make up an extra credit...that's why it is something 'extra'.

Personal Reflection Essay

Towards the end of the semester, you will write a personal reflection essay related to a sociocultural aspect. The essay will be written in English, and it will be an opinion type of essay. It should be typed and it should follow the guidelines given when time comes. The Personal Reflection Essay serves as an assessment of the student's performance of the core curriculum objectives in the specific context of this course. I will provide information concerning the presentation, formatting and grading of this project later in the semester. The subject of the essay will be a cultural topic or topics assigned by the instructor according to the instructor's preference. The cultural topic will present the student with an ethical dilemma or issue for resolution. Students should demonstrate that they have adequately researched and considered the topic in the framework of the core curriculum objectives.

Language Laboratory

You will take a quiz based on videos you will have to watch at the World Languages Laboratory in Bea Wood 127. There are a total of six lab quizzes to complete, one for each chapter covered this semester. Please give your MSU Student ID to the lab attendant in order to receive your quiz. You will receive a quiz and a Scantron. You are not allowed to use books, notes, or any other materials when completing the quiz. Also, do not write on the quiz. Please sign out at the lab attendant's desk in order to retrieve your student id. Make-up and/or late quizzes are not permitted. Your lowest lab grade will be dropped at the end of the semester.
