## **Course Goals:**

- Apply key rhetorical concepts through analyzing and composing a variety of texts
- Engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, collaboration, and revision
- Use reading and composing for inquiry, learning, thinking, and communicating in various rhetorical contexts
- Use strategies such as interpretation, synthesis, response, critique, and design to compose texts that integrate the writer's ideas with those from appropriate sources
- Use sources ethically and in contextually appropriate ways and follow a designated style guide
- Demonstrate proficient use of linguistic structures, including grammar and mechanics, through practice in composing and revising

# Grading Policy:

This class will not use the plus/minus grading system. In this class, the following numerical equivalents for final grades are used:

A = 100-90%; B = 89-80%; C = 79-70%; D = 69-60%; F = 59-0

Letter grades have the following significance: A indicates excellent work, B indicates good work, C indicates satisfactory work, D indicates passing work, F indicates failing work. Consequently, an essay that meets the basic requirements earns a C, not an A or B. If you wish to earn As and Bs, you will have to work hard to produce better than satisfactory, or average, writing.

**IMPORTANT:** A grade of **C** or higher in ENGL 1143 is required for graduation from Midwestern State University.

## Submission Format and Policy:

The Proposal Paper, Synthesis Research Paper, and Annotated Bibliography must follow MLA style (not APA). A sample paper for each of these is included in the content of the course. The style preference includes the following:

- Header: writer's last name and page number
- Identification: writer's full name, instructor's name, course title-number-section, date
- Title: centered
- Spacing: Double-spaced throughout (extra space eliminated)
- Margins: One inch margins on top, bottom, and sides of text
- Font: Times New Roman, Calibri, or Arial; size 12

Submit these papers in the corresponding D2L drop box by its due date by 11:00 PM. Submission is <u>not</u> through email.

Type the Timed-Writing essay into the written-response box in D2L. MLA format is not required

but paragraphing is.

**Late Assignment Policy:** You may submit a late paper at a penalty of 10 points. The latesubmission period ends 48 hours after the deadline. A late timed-writing essay requires special permission from the instructor.

**Academic Dishonesty:** Plagiarism is the use of someone else's thoughts, words, ideas, or lines of argument in your own work without appropriate documentation (a parenthetical citation in the text and a listing in "Works Cited")—whether you use that material in a quote, paraphrase, or summary. At the least, plagiarism will result in an F on an assignment. At the worst it will result in an F in the course. I will follow the reporting procedures of the English Department and the Dean of Students.

On May 23, 2023, Joseph M. Keegin, an editor at *The Point* and a doctoral student in philosophy at Tulane University, wrote: "the basic purpose of education [is] to develop the skills, to cultivate the virtues and habits of mind, and to acquire the knowledge necessary for leading a rich and meaningful human life." Keegin's opinion is that AI, such as ChatGPT, robs a college student of an education. I agree. <u>Therefore, if you submit an assignment that is artificially</u> generated in part or whole, the submission earns at least an F, at worst no grade—0.

**Students with Disabilities:** The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a federal antidiscrimination statute that provides comprehensive civil rights protection for persons with disabilities.
