1143 Course Goals:

In English 1143, students will

- Apply key rhetorical concepts through analyzing and composing a variety of texts.
- Engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, collaboration, and revision.
- Use reading and composing for inquiry, learning, thinking, and communicating in various rhetorical contexts.
- Use strategies such as interpretation, synthesis, response, critique, and design to compose texts that integrate the writer's ideas with those from appropriate sources.
- Use sources ethically and in contextually appropriate ways and follow a designated style guide.
- Demonstrate proficient use of linguistic structures, including grammar and mechanics, through practice in composing and revising.

<u>Participation & In-class work</u>: Participation is one of the key aspects in this course. Any work done and submitted during class will count towards your grade. Also, you are expected to behave as responsible adults in class. Students who violate the following rules will be asked to leave the classroom:

- i. Raise your hand before speaking
- ii. Do not chatter with your neighbor when others are talking
- iii. Do not text, surf the internet, or take calls during class
- iv. Take your headphones off before entering class.
- v. Do not sleep through class.

Grading Scale:

This class will not use the plus/minus grading system. In this class, the following numerical equivalents for final grades are used:

| A = 100-90% | indicates excellent work |
|-------------|-----------------------------|
| B = 89-80% | indicates good work |
| C = 79-70% | indicates satisfactory work |
| D = 69-60% | indicates passing work |
| F = 59-0 | indicates failing work |

Consequently, essays that meet the basic requirements earn a C, not an A or B. If you wish to earn A's and B's, you will have to work harder to produce better than satisfactory, or average, writing. A grade of C or better is required by the university to receive credit for this course.

<u>Grammar Exercise (up to 3 points)</u>: You may complete the grammar exercises in Achieve for extra credit points. Further instructions will be given in class.

<u>Reading Responses (up to 3 points)</u>: You may submit reading responses for extra credit. Please see "Reading Response Guidelines" in 1143 D2L for more information.

Midterm Grades: In order to help students keep track of their progress toward course objectives, I will provide a Midterm Progress Report through each student's WebWorld account. I will submit a grade for all students, not just those in danger of failing the course. Midterm grades will not be reported on the students' transcript; nor will they be calculated in the cumulative GPA. They simply give you an idea of where you stand at the midpoint of the semester. Students earning below a C at the midway point should make an appointment with me and consider visiting the Writing Center.

All formal papers will be uploaded into the D2L Dropbox folder. Late Assignment Policy: All assignments should be turned in on the assigned due date. Late work (Essay 1-4) will automatically lose 10% points each day it's late. There will be **NO** make-ups for timed essay and final exam.

Academic Dishonesty: : The term "plagiarism" includes, but is not limited to, the use by paraphrase or direct quotation, of the published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgement. It also includes the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials. All formal papers will run through the Turnitin for an originality report. At the very least, plagiarism will result in an F on the assignment; at worst, the consequence will be an F in the course.
