Response Papers

Short papers (1 to 2 pages) that respond to a prompt directly related to a reading

Literary Analysis Essay

Writing Project 1 (WP#1): Longer paper (3 pages) that analyzes an element of fiction from a short story.

Comparative Essay

Writing Project 2 (WP#2): Longer paper (3 pages) that compares at least two poems.

Literary Research Paper & Annotated Bibliography

Writing Project 3 (WP#3): Longest paper (5 pages) that explores a research topic connected to a literary reading. Annotated bibliography will summarize and evaluate sources used in the literary research paper.

Reading Quizzes

Completion of multiple-choice reading quizzes (RQ) housed in D2L due Sunday @11:59pm.

Remix Project

Writing Project 4 (WP#4): You will present your research paper to the class using multimodal text.

Discussion Boards

Participation in regular discussion boards about varying topics including: readings, topic brainstorms, & peer reviews. For each discussion board, your initial post should be posted by Tuesday @11:59 pm and your response should be posted by Thursday @11:59 pm. Week 1's Discussion Board is slightly different due to the holiday break. Due dates in Schedule!
