Syllabus

The primary objective of the course is to develop students' skills in clear and effective composition and standard usage of the English language. In English 2113, students compose, convincingly support, and polish persuasive, thesis-driven essays. The course can be used to satisfy the Writing Proficiency Requirement.

Course goals: Students will

- write thesis-based essays that provide strong support and specific details
- engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, and revision
- demonstrate critical and creative thinking about a timely issue or debatable topic
- demonstrate proficient use of Standard Written English

Prerequisites: Completion of the Communication Core

Required texts: *The Little, Brown Brief* (LBB), 6th edition with MLA update. You may purchase an older/cheaper edition, but you will need to make any needed adjustments to chapters referenced in course content.

Required software: A word processor or application that allows you to save your written assignments as Word Documents, and an Adobe Reader to read my comments if I return the assignments to you as a PDF.

Assignments:

Quizzes (10%): There are ten quizzes. Your final grammar exam will be based on the content of these quizzes and the exam will count heavily, so don't please don't take the quizzes lightly! The week's quizzes are open 5 a.m. on Monday until 11:30 p.m. on the following Sunday. Before taking a quiz, read the associated chapter in the LBB and review all the material posted in D2L under Content > Review Quiz Module # for the quiz topic. Quizzes must be taken during the week assigned (i.e., there are no make-up quizzes). Each quiz is worth 1 point on your final grade. For example, if you make a 90 on a quiz, it will be worth .9 or if you make a 30, it will be worth .3. If you miss a quiz, you will lose that 1 point. You may take the quizzes up to 4 times to improve your grade. Your highest attempt will be the recorded grade. To view the results for each quiz, click the drop-down arrow next to an exam, and click Submission. In the window that opens, in the upper left, click Attempt #.

Writing assignments (50%): You have five writing assignments: a simple thesis and topic sentence assignment (W1); an assignment in which you submit two body paragraphs (W2); and three complete essays (W3, W4, W5).

Final exams (40%): The final exam consists of two parts: a grammar exam (20%) and a thesis-driven essay (20%). These will be scheduled for access within D2L the final week of class.

Late assignment policy: All assignments are due on the dates assigned. No late work will be accepted unless specific arrangements have been made prior to the due date. Students falling two assignments behind are subject to administrative withdrawal from the course by the instructor.

Acceptable submission format and process: All formal writing assignments submitted for grading must conform to the *Writing and Formatting Your Essay* and *Essay Grading Guidelines* documents posted to D2L. Assignments are to be submitted to the Dropbox folders in the course D2L website.

Email format: When sending emails to the instructor, please use the D2L email system. (Please do not send duplicate emails to the instructor's D2L account and msutexas email address.)

Required contact: Students are required to interact with the instructor within the D2L course management system at regular intervals during the semester or term. By completing your weekly quiz on time and submitting assignments on time, you will meet this requirement. Any student who fails to interact with an instructor via submissions to D2L, email, or in person during any one-week period of the term may be subject to administrative withdrawal from the course by the instructor.

Academic dishonesty: All students are expected to adhere to the Midwestern State University Student Honor Creed when completing any work for this course. A student's name on any assignment scheduled to be turned in is his/her pledge that all work contained therein is his/hers alone. When using the ideas of other unpublished and published sources, students must use accepted documentation conventions (i.e., MLA or APA). If a direct quote is not placed in quotation marks, this will be considered plagiarism. See the MSU Student Handbook (attached to D2L course web site) to read the Student Honor Creed and the university's policy on academic dishonesty.

Plagiarism Note: All work submitted to D2L will be scanned by the Turnitin® program, which flags text that has been quoted from a published source. If you submit text in which quoted text is not placed in "quotation marks" and the correct source is not cited, you will receive a grade of zero for that assignment. If this occurs twice in the course, you will receive a grade of "F" for the course. There are no exceptions to this policy (e.g., Stating, "I meant to put the text in quotation marks but forgot to do so: please give me another chance" won't change the outcome). Please don't allow plagiarism to negatively impact your grade.

Professionalism: Members of this class are expected to treat one another with courtesy, professionalism, and respect. Repeated unprofessional, rude, or inappropriate behavior can result in 50-100 points being deducted from a student's final grade for the course per instance of such behavior.
