Course Goals:

Given the limits on our available time, we will read and discuss a series of representative texts while we attempt to understand more fully the intellectual environments associated with British literature from the Romantic era forward, and how the growing prevalence of writing helped to shape the perceptions of English society.

Some of the texts contain controversial topics and adult situations, such as violence and rape.

Discussion Leading Task: Each student will select a single text from the scheduled works for the semester. The discussion leader will compose a 2 page paper containing their notes and observations about the text, including at least two academic references from the Moffett database. On the day of the discussion for that text, the student leader will begin the discussion by sharing their reflections on the piece. The leader may submit their observations as a bullet list of main points, or they may choose to compose a more formal essay. This may be composed in a less formal and more conversational way, according to the preference of the author.

Grading Policy: This class will not use the plus/minus grading system for *final grades*. The following numerical equivalents for final grades are used:

Midterm Grades: In order to help students keep track of their progress toward course objectives, a Midterm Progress Report through each student's Navigate account will be provided by the instructor. Midterm grades will not be reported on the students' transcripts; nor will they be calculated in the cumulative GPA. Students earning below a C at the midway point should make an appointment with the instructor and consider visiting the Tutoring & Academic Support Programs Center.

Submission Format and Policy: All formal assignments are to be typed and formatted – and outside sources documented - according to MLA style. All formal papers will be uploaded into the D2L Dropbox folder and/or Achieve.

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Late Assignment Policy: Late assignments, defined as work not submitted by the designated date and time posted in the D2L Dropbox/Submission folder, will be accepted, but they will lose 10% of the final grade. Additionally, no late work will be accepted more than 48 hours after the original deadline. If you are unable to come to class on the day an assignment is due, you should still upload it into the D2L Dropbox folder on time to avoid late paper deductions.

Academic Dishonesty: Plagiarism is the use of someone else's thoughts, words, ideas, or lines of argument in your own work without appropriate documentation (a parenthetical citation at the end and a listing on the Works Cited page) whether you use that material in a quote, paraphrase, or summary. All formal papers will run through the Turnitin for an originality report. At the very least, plagiarism will result in an F on the assignment; at worst, the consequence will be an F in the course. Offenders will be reported to the Chair of the Department of English, Humanities, and Philosophy and/or the Director of Student Conduct.

Use of writings generated by Artificial Intelligence (AI), including ChatGPT, will not be allowed for writing assignments in this course. If the Turnitin system flags a paper for having been written by AI, you will be scheduled for a meeting with the professor to discuss the content of your paper. If your paper is determined not to have been written by you, then the penalty will be identical to the penalties described for plagiarism in the paragraph above.

My sincere hope is that rather than dreading and avoiding performing their own tasks, that students will seize the opportunity to develop their own ideas and creativity, rather than outsourcing their own thinking and communication. Students who take the time and initiative to convey their own ideas through writing will be able to reflect later on the excellent work they performed during their time at university. I hope each student will make the effort to begin a personal tradition of excellence in all their endeavors.

Attendance Policy: It is important that you attend class and arrive on time. Missed instruction will make it difficult for you to excel in the class. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of class. Students who arrive late need to notify the instructor at the end of the class session so their attendance is counted. After the first two unexcused absences, the student will lose one semester point per unexcused absence. Two tardy arrivals will be equal to one absence. Unless you have made prior arrangements with the instructor, leaving the class early will also result in one absence. If you need to miss several classes due to personal reasons, you should alert the Dean of Students office and provide them with the necessary documentation so that they can verify the situation for all of your instructors. After 6 absences, the instructor may exercise the option of dropping the student from the course with an (F) classification.

Tutoring: Tutoring and Academic Support Programs (TASP) provides free drop-in tutoring for MSU students.
