- Demonstrate ability to think critically
- Write paragraphs and thesis-based essays that provide strong support and specific details
- Engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, and revision
- Demonstrate proficient use of Standard Written English

Plagiarism Policy: Plagiarism is the use of someone else's thoughts, words, ideas, or lines or argument in your own work without appropriate documentation (a parenthetical citation at the end and a listing in "Works Cited")—whether you use that material in a quote, paraphrase, or summary. It is a theft of intellectual property and will not be tolerated whether intentional or not. At the least, plagiarism will result in a 0 on the assignment; at worst, the consequence will be an automatic F for the course. I will follow the reporting procedure required by the Dean of Students. Grading: Course Grade – Your grades in this course are based on this scale: A=100-90%; B=89-80%; C=79-70%; D=69-60%; F=59-0%. According to MSU's Undergraduate Catalogue, "letter grades have the following significance: A indicates excellent work, B indicates good work, C indicates satisfactory work, D indicates passing work, F indicates failing work" (73). Consequently, an essay that meets the basic requirements earns a C, not an A or B. If you wish to earn As and Bs, you will have to work hard to produce better than satisfactory, or average, writing.

Passing this course requires a final grade of C or better. Your grade in ENGL 0043 is part of your overall GPA.

Homework: Homework assignments are listed on the daily schedule along with their due dates. Homework is due at the beginning of class.

Participation: Participation is bringing your books, binder, homework, and writing assignments to class. It is also taking part in individual work, group work, and workshops. Failing to work during class lowers your participation grade. You may raise your participation grade by attending an event sponsored by the English Department. See the classroom bulletin board.

Attendance Policy: Attendance in this class is mandatory. You're allowed 3 absences. The second absence results in contact from an Academic Success counselor if your grades are below C or contact with the Dean of Students if your average is C or better. The third absence requires a conference with me. The fourth earns an F in the course and the lost opportunity to continue attending class. Don't miss out on an education due to absences. Submission Format and Policy: Submit all writing assignments—paragraphs and essays, whether they are handwritten or typed—in MLA format. The guidelines are as follows

- Double space.
- Maintain a one-inch margin around the text.
- Use a font of Times New Roman 12.
- Type or write on one side of the paper.
- Give the essay a title, centered. Do not use the thesis statement or question as a title.
- Indent each paragraph.
- Number each page in the header with your last name followed by a space in the upper right corner.
- List your first name, instructor's name, course and class number, and due date—day and then month and then year (no commas)—in the identification on the left.

Do not send assignments as email attachments. Submit all work during class time on the due date unless otherwise noted on the assignment sheet.

Note: you may not submit a paper for a grade in this class that already has been (or will be) submitted for a grade in another course, unless you obtain the explicit written permission of me and the other instructor involved in advanced.

By enrolling in this class, you expressly grant MSU a "limited right" in all intellectual property created by you for the purpose of this course. The "limited right" shall include but shall not be limited to the right to reproduce your work product in order to verify originality and authenticity and for educational purposes.

Content/Form-Response Grids: You will annotate each reading assignment in ENGL 1143 and then transfer that annotation to a Content/Form-Response Grid. Content and form are the information (the *what*) you learned from the text, and response is the way the information shaped your experience (the *how*). Each grid is 5% of your final grade.

Source Summaries: The Research Paper requires 4 sources—3 of which must be academic articles. Each source must be printed as a hard copy, annotated with pen or pencil, and summarized. This summary is typed on a source cover sheet. Although the Research Paper is an ENGL 1143 grade, the source summaries are counted in both ENGL 0043 and 1143. A sample source will be made available to you. In 0043, each summary is 5% of your course grade.

Grammar Quizzes: Grammar quizzes are 25% of your total grade. You will take 5 quizzes outside of class so that you can use your *Clear Thinking and Writing* textbook and learn the skills.

Extra Credit: I do not give extra credit assignments.

Late Work:

- I do not accept late homework, which consists of assignments from the textbook.
- I do accept late grammar quizzes and writing assignments until the work has been graded and returned to the class.
- Late assignments earn a grade deduction of 10 points per weekday. So turn in work during my office hours to prevent excessive penalty.

Writing Center: Begin drafting papers as early as possible and take advantage of the MSU Writing Center, located off the 2nd floor atrium of Prothro-Yeager. Tutoring is available Monday through Thursday from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM; you can also find a tutor at the satellite location in Moffett Library Honors Lounge, Sunday and Thursday from 6:00 to 9:00 PM. Writing tutors will not edit your papers for you, but they will provide support and feedback at every stage of the writing process, from brainstorming to drafting, revising to proofreading.

Instructor Class Policies

Be on time

- If you are repeatedly late to class, I will begin marking you absent.
- If extenuating circumstances prevent you from arriving on time, please let me know.

Practice courtesy

- When I am speaking to the class, do not walk in front of me. If you arrive late to class, wait outside the classroom until I invite you in. When another student is speaking, listen.
- Silence and put away all cell phones and other electronic devices.
- If you leave the classroom for any reason, you do not need my permission. Simply leave when I or a classmate is not speaking.
