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Course Description

- This course is designed to educate the Exercise Physiologists pertaining to the role exercise plays in the prevention and treatment of chronic diseases.
 A secondary focus of the course is practical and clinical experience in physiological measures of health, fitness and performance.
- Additionally, a laboratory experience is required. This will entail the introduction and subsequent proficiency by the students of clinical measures associated with health and fitness.
- This class is supplemented with online work through D2L. It is imperative that you check the site for this class on a daily basis for assignments or readings

Grading

1. There will be **two (2) exams** following selected chapters & lectures in the noted text throughout the semester. These tests are associated with the lecture/chapter portion of the class. There will be **two (2) practicum evaluations** (i.e., tests) associated with the laboratory portion of the class. Each exam will be worth <u>20 points</u> each toward the overall grade (40 points total). Each laboratory practicum will be worth <u>7.5 points</u> toward the final overall grade (15 points total) and will cover the new material since the last practicum.

2. **Class Assignments/Discussions**: There will be a day periodically where an assignment or discussion will be noted. During this day, the students will answer questions posed by the Professor from previous lectures. To participate in this work, the students MUST be present. Missing the assignment/discussion experience will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis. Should your absence be allowed, you may complete the assignment/discussion with a timeline set by the instructor.

Assignment/Discussion 10 points

- 3. Project points. Each student will participate and complete an EXCEL spreadsheet project. A template will be given to the students for clarification. The spreadsheet will contain specific acute and chronic pathologies, the etiology of these pathologies, the prevention and treatment of these pathologies through exercise and the exercise prescription for the prevention and treatment of these pathologies including but not limited to the following information: mode of exercise, intensity, duration, frequency, physiological adaption outcome.

- 4. **FINAL EXAM**: Comprehensive **20 points**

Attendance

In addition, there is a lab on Thursday following the lecture. This is a hybrid (in-person and online) lab. PLEASE NOTE: The lab experiences and assignments will be time based. This means that regardless of the presentation format (i.e., in-person, online), completion of the lab will be given a designated time.
- 4. *The final exam is set at the beginning of the semester and this time is assessable to all students. This set time for the final exam is not negotiable. There will be no flexibility in altering the day or time for taking the final exam.

Instructor Class Policies
