### Course Objectives

This course is intended to introduce the fundamental skills and concepts needed to design and conduct research at the graduate level and develop the ability to evaluate the research of others. Establish the first three chapters in a Master's Thesis.

This course will examine methods of qualitative, descriptive, and experimental inquiry. Emphasis will be placed on the use of references and resources; developing problem statements; purpose of the study; literature review; data collection; data analysis; data interpretation; and areas of additional research.

#### Exams

Two Exams: Mid-Term over material previously presented; Final Exam, Comprehensive.

# Projects Required

Students will design a research project pertinent to the field of study. They will be responsible for conducting background literature review and determining methodology, selection of subjects, determination of instruments for data collection, and selection of statistical procedures. This will be equivalent to the first three chapters in a Master's Thesis (a research proposal). In will include the following: 1) Introduction; 2) Literature Review; 3) Methodology. A hard copy of this paper (referred to as the "document") will be due for all class members on a specific date.

**PowerPoint Presentation**: Each student will present their research proposal in Power Point on a date determined through random selection procedures.
