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Course Description

This online course is designed to develop knowledge regarding specific noted injuries (i.e., acute, chronic), theory and clinical application of injury rehabilitation and therapeutic exercise used for exercise physiologists to restore patients, clients, athletes and other physically active individuals to their pre-injury levels of fitness, strength, power, endurance and speed.

Textbook & Instructional Materials None. Associated readings from peer-reviewed research

Course Objectives

- a. Students will demonstrate through discussion and written evaluations the etiology and mechanisms of physical injury or trauma.
- b. Students will demonstrate through discussion and written evaluations the theoretical concepts, components and phases of a rehabilitation program.
- c. Students will demonstrate through discussion and written evaluations the indications and contraindications of therapeutic exercises, as well as the progress of the rehabilitation protocol.
- d. Students will demonstrate through discussion and written evaluations the process of implementing a therapeutic exercise protocol, assess the patients progress and make changes when needed to progress the recovery and return to activity.
- e. Students will demonstrate through discussion and written evaluation the role of surgery in the repair/modification of bone/tissue to facilitate the return of the patient to activity.

Format of Class and Grading

1.Injuries/trauma will be introduced via D2L online message. As an example: ACL rupture. Students will be given an assignment pertaining to ACL ruptures. This might be the etiology (mechanism leading up to the rupture), of ACL ruptures or in addition the rehabilitation of ACL ruptures. The inquiries into the etiology and/or rehab will follow the format of "Assignments" noted below. For this example, the student would find a research article on "mechanisms of ACL rupture" and/or "rehabilitating ACL ruptures" and then provide a one page summary of that paper as noted below. Additionally, the class would engage in "Online Discussions" as noted below.

- 2. Online Discussions:. To earn credit for participation, you must respond to the initial post from the Professor. The discussions allow you to engage and interact with other students. All posting must be informative. It is "ok" to disagree, but keep your postings "respectful and polite" and pertaining to the original prompt by the Professor.
- 3.Evaluation in this course will be covered in the following way: Assignments: Assignments will be posted on D2L. All directions and attachments will be listed for the assignment. The following are assignments utilized in this course: a. Summary of research articles on topics given by the Professor (Word document, 1 page, double spaced, 12 point font) Late Submission Policy: Late assignments or discussions will result in a zero for the assignment.
