Course Description:

The focus of this course is on the application of holistic nursing principles and concepts used to assist families to achieve their maximum potential. Emphasis is on interrelationships and intra-relationships of children and their families, as well as appreciation of cultural diversity. Nursing process will be pediatric specific, with special consideration to developmentally appropriate nursing care and ethical decision-making.

*Per Wilson School of Nursing policy, students are to achieve an average of at least 74% on unit exams. The exam average as well as the course average of at least 74% is required to successfully complete this course. If a student does not earn at least 74% exam average, no other grades will be averaged into the course grade, and the student will receive the exam average grade as their course grade. For example, if a student has a 73% exam average, the student will receive a D for the course.

Students who earn at least a 74% average on the exam average will have the exams, writing assignments and Tophat quizzes calculated as weighted in the table above as the course grade.

Grades will not be rounded. If a student earns 73.8% exam average or course average, the grade recorded will be D. The exam average and the course average must be at least 74.0%.

Class Participation. Students are expected to participate in class discussion and activities. Pre-class assignments, including pre-recorded lectures and quizzes, will be assigned to students through TopHat to be completed. Assignments will be due before class begins. Late assignments will not be accepted. The quizzes must be complete prior to class.

Safety in Medication Administration Writing Assignment. This is a writing assignment to challenge the learner demonstrate understanding of the rights of medication administration and the adverse effects that may occur as a result of unsafe medication administration practices. The due date is listed in the course calendar. The instructions and grading criteria are located in D2L. Submit to the dropbox in D2L/Brightspace (100 points).

Holistic Care Writing Assignment. This is a writing assignment based on development of a chronically ill or terminally ill child and the family dynamics that are observed. The due date for this is listed on the course calendar. The instructions and grading criteria are located in D2L. Submit to the dropbox in D2L/Brightspace (100 points).

Exams:

This course has 6 unit exams. All exams are cumulative, meaning students are expected to bring forward knowledge and skills from previous courses and the current course and apply it while answering exam questions.

The exams emphasize student's critical thinking skills. In this course, faculty will not

provide extra blueprints or study guides for exams. It is the student's responsibility to study all covered material assigned in lectures, readings, and assignments. Exam question type will include multiple choice, select all that apply, and/or fill in the blank. Each exam will consist of 25 multiple choice and 5 clinical math questions.

Exams are to reflect the student's individual effort, therefore **collaboration**, **talking** during the exam, or having any physical or digital materials or equipment during the exam will be considered academic dishonesty. A dropdown calculator is available on Examsoft. Exam Guidelines are as follows:

- 1. Turn all cell phones and electronic devices OFF and leave them in the back of the room with your belongings. If your phone starts ringing or vibrating, it distracts everyone. You will be allowed to turn it off. If it occurs a second time, you will be asked to submit your exam (no matter how many questions you have completed) and exit the room. I do NOT tolerate disruptions during exams!
- 2. No smartwatches will be allowed. Smartwatches must be placed in your backpack during exams.
- 3. Leave everything EXCEPT your laptop or tablet in the back of the room.
- 4. Only ONE beverage will be allowed to have within student reach.
- 5. Only ONE writing utensil will be allowed
- 6. If you need to use the restroom, do so BEFORE the exam starts. You will not be permitted to leave the room during the exam. If you leave the room during the exam, you will NOT be permitted to re-enter. The exam will be graded as is, if you leave the room.
- 7. I will NOT discuss the answers during or after class.
- 8. I will NOT answer questions during the exam. This disturbs everyone during the exam.
- 9. Prior to exiting the classroom, you MUST turn in scratch paper with your name at the top and display the green Successful Upload screen from Examsoft. If this does not display, help will be provided in uploading your exam. Not turning in your scrap paper is considered academic dishonesty and a grade of zero (0) will be given for the exam.
- 10. If students are caught cheating, they will receive an automatic "0" for that exam, no exceptions.
- 11. If a student misses any exam, the student may take the Make-up Exam scheduled on the course calendar at the end of the semester. The Make-up Exam is located in the CE 4th floor nursing conference room. The exam will be comprehensive of the content throughout the course.

Exam rationales to missed questions will be released using the Examsoft platform for testing. Faculty will not review exams with students on an individual basis unless the student is achieving less than a 74% exam average after the second exam. Faculty will not review exam questions under any circumstances, but will provide recommendations for exam and study strategies based on student's exam performance.

Missed Exams:

Should the student be absent from an exam, it is the student's responsibility to notify the course coordinator at least two hours prior to the exam or as soon as possible if an emergency is the cause of missing the exam. Students may make- up exams on the make-up exam session as documented on the course calendar.

Failure to comply with this policy will result in a zero for the exam(s) missed. Any makeup exam may be different from the original exam and may include multiple choice, essay, short answer, true and false, and/or matching questions.

Course Attendance:

Students are expected to attend all of the classes in which they are enrolled. Although in general students are graded on intellectual effort and performance rather than attendance, absences may lower the student's grade where class attendance and class participation are deemed essential by the faculty member. Class activities will not be made up due to absences. If a student anticipates missing an exam, **they must notify faculty through e-mail at least 2 hours in advance**. Exams can only be made up for excused absences (student ill, must provide doctor note; ill parent, domestic partner, or child). There will be one make-up exam day. Any missed exams will be made-up on that date, on the Friday before finals week.

If a student has more than 2 excused or unexcused absences, they will be warned by faculty. If truancy continues, a referral will be made to the Office of Student Rights and Responsibility. Students may be dropped from the course for excessive absences (more than 4 for this class) per University Policy.

Additionally, you are expected to employ manners and respect during all classroom and clinical meetings. Meals should be eaten before or after classes and clinical, not during. Do NOT bring food into the classroom. If you are going to be late to class, you may enter quietly and sit in the back row of the room. Do NOT enter the room late during an exam. Late entry is disruptive to your classmates and the instructor.

Midterm Progress:

In order to help students keep track of their progress toward course objectives, the instructor for this course will provide a Midterm Progress Report through each student's WebWorld account. Midterm grades will not be reported on the student's transcript; nor will they be calculated in the cumulative GPA. They simply give students an idea of where they stand at midpoint of the semester. Students earning below a C at the midway point should schedule a meeting with the faculty and seek out tutoring through the Tutoring & Academic Support Programs (link to the website https://msutexas.edu/academics/tasp/).

Late Work:

Any assignments submitted late will be docked 10 points from the final score for each day it is late, up to three (3) days. If an assignment is turned in more than three (3) days after the due date, the assignment will be given a "0".

Classroom Etiquette:

Students are expected to act respectfully to all peers, faculty, and guests during face-toface lectures and in clinical settings. Cell phones must be turned off or placed in silent mode before class begins. Should emergency communication need to be made, the student must step outside of the classroom.

Additional Course Requirements:

- 1. Students must maintain satisfactory health as determined by the total faculty consensus.
- Follow APA 7th edition formatting. Use APA approved font type and size (i.e., Times New Roman, 12 point), one-inch margins, and single spacing after punctuation ending a sentence. A title page and reference page is required; no Table of Contents or abstract are needed; and the paper should include level/subject headings.
- 3. Faculty reserves the right to make changes to this syllabus at any time.
- 4. Students must maintain current immunization records, current CPR card, validated Health Insurance, and paid liability insurance in Certified Background as required by the Wilson School of Nursing. In order to attend clinical experiences, each student MUST comply with each of these requirements throughout the entire semester.
 - 5. Students are responsible for all communications sent by faculty via D2L. You are expected to check the site for announcements, assignments, messages, etc

Nursing Program Failure Policy

- 1. Students must meet all course requirements or a grade of F will be assigned.
- 2. Students are expected to pass both clinical and classroom components of the course. Failure in either clinical or classroom will result in failure in both. Clinical failure results in a course and clinical grade of F. Classroom failure results in the grade earned in the classroom for both course and clinical.
- 3. A student who withdraws/drops or receives a D or an F in two nursing courses must seek reentry to the nursing program to be eligible to continue in the program.
- 4. The faculty reserves the right to recommend to the School of Nursing Chair and College of Human Services and Health Sciences withdrawal of a student from the nursing program for health, legal, or academic reasons, particularly if client care is jeopardized. In addition, the student must perform within the ANA Standards of Practice and Code of Ethics.

Academic Dishonesty:

All students are expected to pursue their scholastic careers with honesty and integrity. Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, cheating on a test or other course

work, plagiarism (offering the work of another as one's own OR submitting your own previously submitted/graded work for a new assignment), and the unauthorized collaboration (collusion) with another person. Students found guilty of dishonesty in their scholastic pursuits are subject to penalties that may include suspension or expulsion from the University.

All written work submitted for evaluation is to be the work of the student who submits it. Citations and references are to be used and documented using APA 7th Edition. The faculty considers collaboration during examinations or obtaining previous test questions from past students as cheating and cheating is in violation of Midwestern Policy. A score of zero (0) will be given for students participating in collaboration of tests, cheating, collusion, or plagiarism or other submitted paperwork with the exception of a required group project.

NURS 3863 adheres to the *MSU Code of Student Conduct*. Academic dishonesty, however small, creates a breach in academic integrity. A student's participation in this course comes with the expectation that his or her work will be completed in full observance of the *MSU Code of Student Conduct*. Many components of NURS 3863 are designed to be highly interactive with students helping each other learn by providing a different point of view, much as would occur in a face-to-face classroom. Students are encouraged to take full advantage of the many resources available including online Desire2Learn course resources, internet sites, other textbooks and journals, faculty, and peers. This interactive collegial learning environment is conducive for life-long learning. All components of NURS 3863 are designed to represent the efforts of each student INDIVIDUALLY and are NOT to be shared, copied, or plagiarized from other sources. When students submit their efforts for grading, they are attesting they abided by this rule.

A second incident of plagiarism by the same student will result in a grade of "F" for this course.
