Course Description

Introduction and survey of the basic concepts of psychology as a science of behavior and mental processes. Includes research and current information in the areas of learning, states of consciousness, human development, personality, and abnormal behavior.

Goals

- 1) 1. To increase multiple-choice test-taking skills and improve study skills/time management. This will be accomplished by:
 - a) Taking 5 tests.
 - b) Instruction on study and test-taking skills.
 - c) Having questions over sections of the chapter that are not discussed in class.
 - d) Having to decipher ambiguously written questions.

- e) Having to choose between the “best” and “almost best” answer.
- f) Become proficient with taking tests online and with a LockDown browser.
- 2) Be introduced to the exciting field of psychology.
 - a) Review each chapter as a survey of a major area of study within the field.
 - b) In-class discussions.

Course Requirements

Lectures are for enrolled students only. *Permission to post any audio/visual recording of the instructor on social media (e.g., TikTok, YouTube, etc.) IS NOT granted and a violation of the instructor’s privacy. Any student caught posting a video(s) of the instructor will be dropped from the course and receive a grade of “F.” In addition, the behavior will be reported to the proper university authorities for discipline.

Grades will be based on your performance 2 quiz, 5 exams, a written essay, and a research requirement.

(200 points-50 points each) 5 **exams** will be worth 50 points, and the lowest score will be dropped. This means a student who has earned an “**A**” average on the first 4 exams does not have to attend the final (those students will be notified after the 4th exam). Students with a “**B+**” or lower must attend the final; this is solely based upon test grades. No other points will be considered. Tests will be multiple

choice. I reserve the right to add essay questions at any point during the semester.

***Note: Exams will be taken in D2L** and open for a minimum of 24 hours. Students who do not have access to a computer/tablet and/or internet at home can take the exam at the Clark Student Center computer lab or the first-floor Dillard computer lab. Lack of access to a computer/tablet and/or internet is not an excuse for failing to take an exam. Questions will be randomly chosen from the test bank. Each exam will last 60 minutes, only one test question will show on the screen, but you will be able to go back and see past questions. .

There is a practice test available on D2L to ensure your computer works with Respondus LockDownBrowser and Monitor. Please try this before the first test. If you experience issues, please reach out to d2lhelp@msutexas.edu.

(10 Points) Study Skills Quiz- 10 items over the first week of study skills. Will be completed in D2L. The quiz will be open for a minimum of 24 hours and students have 10 minutes to complete it. See exams regarding access to a computer/tablet and the internet.

(10 points) Research Requirement- It is important that students of scientific psychology learn firsthand something about the scientific nature of the discipline. Therefore, all students in PSYC 1103 and 2203 are required to participate in one of the two following research-related exercises. **The deadline for completing the research requirement is 12/4 at 11:59pm.**

1. Participate in one or more psychology research projects totaling at least 120 minutes. Research opportunities will be announced throughout the semester in postings that appear at [Undergraduate Research](#).

OR

2. Complete a research ethics essay. Participating students will read academic writings addressing research ethics. Following this, students will complete a 3-4 page double-spaced, typed summary and review of the information they read. Tables, figures, and pictures do not count toward the minimum page

requirement. **Essays must be submitted no later than 12/4 at 11:59pm.**

(15 Points) Assessment for Empirical and Quantitative Skills-15 items over research methods, sampling, and correlation vs causation. Core requirement for the State of Texas. Students will complete this independent quiz after reading Chapter 2.

(25 Points) Ethics Assessment Essay. Core requirement for the State of Texas. A key aspect of Psychological Research is the ethical treatment of participants. Although research ethics are strongly emphasized by modern psychologists, early studies sometimes crossed ethical lines, exposing participants to risks that would be considered unacceptable today. For this assignment, you will choose one famous psychological study that raised ethical concerns and analyze it using the following guidelines.

In your essay you should:

1. Provide an overview of the study
 - a. What questions were the researchers trying to answer?
 - b. Who were the participants?
 - c. What were the procedures
 - d. Summarize the key findings
2. Analyze the ethics based on APA standards
 - a. Identify which ethical principles or standards were most relevant
 - b. Discuss any specific ethical concerns raised by the study
 - c. Clearly explain how the study violated these guidelines
3. Impact on Modern Psychological Research
 - a. How did this study influence ethical practices in modern psychology?
 - b. How would this study need to be redesigned today to meet ethical expectations?

Studies to Choose from: The Monster Study 1939, The Aversion Project 1970s and 1980s, The Stanford Prison Experiment 1970, The Monkey Drug Trials 1969, Landis' Facial Expressions Experiment 1924, Little Albert 1920, Learned Helplessness 1965, Milgram Study 1974, The Well of Despair 1960, David Reimer 1965-2004 (see Ethics Article Option folder under Content for brief descriptions of each study).

Extra Credit

Extra credit can be obtained for each test (up to five points) with the completion of a handwritten study guide in any color ink that is not black or blue turned in during class time on the day of the test. Study guides are a personal resource and should reflect how you learn. Below is an example of how a study guide can be done:

- Section Headings
 - A summary of each subsection
 - Key words of each subsection
 - Diagrams to aid in understanding

Make Up Work/Tests

All papers and assignments must be turned in on the day they are due. ***No exceptions**. If you have an emergency, please let me know in advance, and/or email me your assignment the same day it is due.

Any late papers will be lowered by ***10%**. Late papers can only be turned in with a school sanctioned reason. Lockdown

2. The most common issue is the loss of connection during the test. If you get a blank page or a spinning wheel, you will need to exit the test, close the browser, and re-enter the test.
3. If you are taking this test at home, it is best that no other device is being used that requires the internet while you are taking the test.
4. **Chromebook Laptops and Ipads are NOT compatible with the LockDown Browser**, so you will need to locate a different device. If you have the ability to come to campus, the LockDown Browser is on the computers in the Clark Student Center lab and the first-floor Dillard lab. **Note:** There are no cameras on these computers; you will need to bring your own webcam or check one out from the Library.

Always let your instructor know that you've had technical difficulty and have reached out to D2L.

Please be aware of:

1. The LockDown Browser flags problematic behavior like going off camera, talking, or even being back lit. The instructor gets an alert. All moderate and high alert notifications result in the video being watched for evidence of academic dishonesty. Please don't

- sit with a lamp or bright light behind you as the camera has a hard time reading your face.
2. Please do not take an exam with anyone else present. If you are in an MSU computer lab, we understand that other people may be around. Please don't have conversations with them until after you complete the exam.

Instructor Drop

An instructor may drop a student at any time during the semester for excessive absences, for consistently failing to meet class assignments, for an indifferent attitude, or for disruptive conduct. The instructor must give the student a verbal or written warning prior to dropping the student from the class. An instructor’s drop of a student takes precedence over the student-initiated course drop of a later date. The instructor will assign a grade of either WF or F through the first 9 weeks of a long semester, the first 6 weeks of a 10-week summer term, or the 12th class day of a 4- or 5-week summer term consisting of 20 days. After these periods, the grade will be an F. The date the instructor drop form is received in the Office of the Registrar is the official drop date.
