### Course Objectives:

After completing this course, you will have a greater understanding of:

1. What psychology is and how it is applicable to both the world and us.
2. How we think, learn, and remember
3. How we interact with the world around us through processes like sensation and perception
4. Other areas of psychology including social psychology, industrial organizational psychology, and real-world applications.

### Attendance:

This course has been planned as an asynchronous online course for Spring 2026. I will use D2L for posting syllabi, course communication, course schedule, and gradebook. You should regularly check D2L and the email hosted via D2L for important course information.

### Course Requirements:

1. **Exams:** Students will complete **\*four\*** exams during the semester. Each exam will be worth 100 points for a total of 400 points (80% of your overall course grade). Each exam will contain 50 multiple-choice questions. Exams are not cumulative and will cover information from the book, video lectures, and any supplementary material posted on D2L for each unit. Exams are closed note/book, meaning that you are expected not to use your class materials while completing the exams. As such, all exams will be administered through the Respondus Lockdown Browser (<https://msutexas.edu/distance/lockdown-browser.php>) with webcam proctor. You must install the

lockdown browser **\*BEFORE\*** accessing the exam. Note that lockdown browser is **\*not compatible\*** with chromebooks, phones or tablet! Students needing computer access are welcome to use the on-campus resources in the library or the Clark Student Center. The Psychology computer lab (OD 126) is also available during regular business hours whenever it is not being used for a class. **\*Please note that a webcam is REQUIRED for taking exams\***

**Exam Timing:** Exams will always open at 8:00am CST on the Wednesday of each Exam Week. Exams are due by 5:00pm CST each exam week. Once you open the exam, you must complete it. You will not be able to stop the exam and continue at a later time. Please ensure that you have a quiet place to take your exam that is free from distractions.

**Missed Exam Policy:** Because students get a three-day window to complete exams, there will be **\*no make-ups for missed exams.\*** There will be no exceptions to this policy except for official university travel or documented illness/emergencies (these must be documented through the Dean of Students Office). Please be sure to view the exam schedule and plan accordingly!

2. **Quizzes:** Students will complete 11 online quizzes throughout the semester. Quizzes count for 100 total points (20% of your final grade; your lowest quiz grade will be dropped). Quizzes will contain 10 multiple-choice questions and will be timed for 15 minutes. Students will get one attempt per quiz. Because quizzes are designed to facilitate reading, students may use their textbook and lecture materials when completing quizzes. Quizzes will always open on the Monday of each week and will be due at 11:59pm on Fridays. There will be no quizzes during exam weeks.

**Missed Quiz Policy:** There will be no make-up quizzes. However, your lowest quiz grade will be dropped. **\*Late quiz submissions will not be accepted.\***

3. **Research Participation:** It is important that students of psychology experience the scientific nature of the discipline first-hand. All students in PSYC 2203 are required to participate in **ONE** of the following research related activities. **\*Only choose one – You cannot receive credit for both!\*** **\*Failure to complete the research participation requirement will result in a one letter grade penalty\*.**

- a. **Research study participation:** Participate in approved psychology research projects (**At least 120 minutes**). Research opportunities will be announced throughout the semester and a link to complete the studies will be posted on D2L. The deadline for research participation is May 4<sup>th</sup>, 2026. Studies completed after this date will not be counted. **\*Partial credit will NOT be awarded. You must complete the full 120 minutes of research participation to receive credit.\***

All research studies contain a survey at the end that you must complete to receive credit. This is the only way to log participation. **\*It is your responsibility to ensure that your participation is logged by completing the final survey!\***

- b. **Research Ethics Essay:** Instead of participating in research, students may instead read an academic writing addressing research ethics in psychology. Following this, students will complete a 5 page, double-spaced, typed essay summarizing and reviewing the information. Tables, figures, and pictures do not count toward the page requirement. This essay must be submitted by May 4<sup>th</sup>, 2025. **\*If you would like to complete the Research Ethics Essay instead of the participating in research studies, please email me no later than Friday, 3/6.\***

### **Email Policy:**
