Final Exam: Tuesday, 5/3 at 8:00 - 10:00

An optional, take-home final exam will also be offered. This exam is designed to give students who need/want to improve their grades an opportunity to do so. This exam does not replace the Final Exam, or any other exam; everyone must take Exams 1, 2, and 3, as well as the regular final. If you take the optional final, the grade will be counted in with all the other grades but, hopefully, this represents an opportunity to get a really good test grade. The optional final exam will be comprehensive, and will consist of 100 multiple choice questions. It will be available on 4/26/22 and will have to be turned in no later than the beginning of class on 5/2/22, at the beginning of the regular final exam. Late exams will not be accepted.

Course Requirements: Grades will be based on your performance on at least 3 exams, worth 100 points each. All exams consist of multiple choice questions, on Scantrons (Form 881-E). Exams are comprehensive *for that section*, except for the Option Take-Home Final. Test content will be drawn from readings in the text and from lecture material. Not all lecture material will be found in the text, so regular class attendance is required.

Course grades are based on the number of points accumulated over the semester. There is a total of 300 possible points, so the grade ranges are as follows:

Without the Optional Final Exam:

- A = 270 - 300 points
- B = 240 - 269
- C = 210 - 239
- D = 180 - 209
- F = less than 180 points

With the Optional Final Exam:

- A = 360 - 400 points
- B = 320 - 359
- C = 280 - 319
- D = 240 - 279
- F = less than 240 points

RESEARCH REQUIREMENT

It is important that students of scientific psychology learn firsthand something about the scientific nature of the discipline. Therefore, all students in PSYC 1103 and 2203 are required to participate in one of the following research-related exercises. No extra credit is given for research participation, but failure to complete the research requirement will result in a one letter grade reduction for the course. The deadline for completing the research requirement is 04/26/2022.

1. Participate in one of more psychology research projects totaling at least 90 minutes. Research opportunities will be announced throughout the semester in postings that appear at: <https://msutexas.edu/academics/libarts/psychology/undergraduate-research.php>

OR

2. Complete a research ethics essay. Participating students will read an article provided by me about research ethics. Following this, students will complete a 3 or 4 page, double-spaced, typed summary and review of the information they read. Tables, figures, pictures do not count toward the minimum page requirement. Essays must be submitted no later than 04/26/2022.

Attendance Policy: Students are allowed three (3) absences. Once you exceed this limit, whether the absences are excused or not, you may be dropped from the course with a grade of “F”. I will not be responsible for recording attendance for students who are tardy.

Make-up Policy: You may make up **one** (1) missed exam: if you miss more than one exam, you should drop the course. A mass make-up for exams will be administered on Tuesday, 5/3 following the final exam. No other make-ups will be allowed; if you miss an exam during this semester, you must attend this session. Failure to do so will result in a grade of “0” on the missed exam.

Cheating Policy: Any evidence of cheating on exams will result in dismissal from this class with a grade of “F”. To avoid questions of cheating, make sure you mark your Scantrons cleanly, and use a No. 2 pencil. No grade changes will be made because of “Scantron error.”

Note: Individuals requiring special accommodation may contact me after class or during office hours.

Also note: Cell phones are to be turned off during class. If you have a situation that requires you to receive calls, you need to contact me ahead of time, have your device on vibration mode, and take the call outside the classroom.
