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Course Description

The language teaching community agrees that learning language and culture are inextricably connected. Thus, this course focuses on developing students' German-language proficiency through modes of communication that reflect real life communication in the varied cultures of the German-speaking world. By employing interpersonal, interpretive and presentational communicative modes in German, students will explore the ideas, values, beliefs and other cultural aspects in German-speaking countries and how these aspects work together to affect human experience.

Course Goals

German 1234 covers *Auf geht's* Unit 4-7 and continues to develop the four major language skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing in a highly authentic cultural context. This course will provide you with an ever-expanding set of vocabulary and grammar rules, as well as cultural knowledge, so that you will feel comfortable conversing in German about a wide range of topics. These topics include, but are not limited to your family, your studies, your likes and dislikes, your hobbies, and important historical events. You will learn to interpret German texts from a variety of sources and media and enhance your knowledge of cultural differences and similarities between German-speaking countries and your own.

Desire-to-Learn (D2L)

Extensive use of the MSU D2L program is a part of this course. Each student is expected to be familiar with this program as it provides a primary source of communication regarding assignments, examination materials, grades, and general course information. You can log into <u>D2L</u> through the MSU Homepage.

Core Curriculum Assessment

Essay questions will serve as an assessment of the student's performance of the core curriculum objectives in the specific context of this course. The essay answers will be based

upon a film or article(s) that I will assign around the middle of the semester. The film or article(s) will present the student with an ethical dilemma or issue for resolution. In their responses, students should demonstrate that they have adequately researched and considered the topic in the framework of the core curriculum objectives.

The core objectives for the Language, Philosophy and Culture Foundational Component.

The core objectives for the Language, Philosophy and Culture Foundational Component Area are addressed in this course according to the following descriptions:

- Critical Thinking Skills: Students will demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- Communication Skills: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- Personal Responsibility: Students will demonstrate the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical-decision making.
- Social Responsibility: Students will demonstrate intercultural competence, knowledge
 of civic responsibility and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national and
 global communities.

In responding to the topic, students must identify their core beliefs and the origins of those core beliefs, recognize the ethical issue(s) presented and the relationships between issues, state a position on the issue(s) and connect their position to implied actions and consequences¹.

Homework

You will be responsible for all material included in the course schedule as well as any additional homework assignments given. Completing the assigned interactive and grammar homework prior to every class will increase your comprehension of the material and leave more time to practice speaking German during class. This regular practice is designed to help prepare you for class and to increase your retention of the culture, vocabulary, and grammar we are covering.

You will be asked to complete four basic types of homework assignments for German 1234.

1. **Grammar Explanations**: In preparation for class, you are responsible for reading grammar explanations in the textbook *Auf geht's*. These should be completed before class on the day they are listed in the course schedule and you should bring any questions that you have about what you read/watched to class.

- Grammar Worksheets: These must be downloaded from D2L, printed out, and completed by hand. You are expected to correct your own work with a contrasting ink color and by using the answer keys provided on D2L. This homework must be turned in during class, as indicated on the syllabus.
- 3. **125-Word Essays:** You will be assigned short essays of at least 125 words, which must include the **word count** and be **typed**, **double-spaced**, and turned in during class as a hard copy, as listed in the syllabus. Essays will be graded for both content and language/grammar.
- 4. **Auf geht's textbook:** In preparation for class, you are responsible for completing exercises in the textbook *Auf geht's*. Your answers must be written, either typed or handwritten on a separate paper and submitted in class.

You may be given other types of homework, such as a handout. You are expected to complete all assignments carefully. However, part of learning a language means making mistakes. If you complete your homework and grammar homework on time and in a conscientious manner you will receive a high homework grade for completion. If you do not understand the expectations for a specific assignment, it is your responsibility to ask for clarification before the due date.

Homework Grading Policy

- Grammar worksheets are graded for completion. If you turn in your homework on time and self-corrected using the answer keys on Desire-to-Learn (D2L), you will get a 95.
 No self-correction means you will drop a letter grade for that GW-assignment.
- Essays will be graded according to a rubric. Please note that you are required to write 125 words for each essay, even if the assignment in the book suggests that your essay should be shorter/longer.

Attendance

You are required to be in the classroom for the entire 50-minute period. Arrive on time. You may be counted absent if you are more than 10 minutes late for class or if you leave class early.

This syllabus serves as notice that you may be dropped from the class without further notification if you are absent more than six times. A Conduct and Attendance Referral may be sent to the Dean of Students upon the fourth absence. If you decide to drop the course, you must follow university procedure for dropping a course in order to receive a W. If the instructor drops you, you will receive a WF or F.

Participation **Participation**

The participation grade contributes 5% to your course grade. The participation grade is based upon your use of German in the face-to-face classroom and/or via chats with classmates. Don't worry about speaking perfect German. Accuracy will come with practice and repetition.

Quizzes

There will be regular 5 min.-long quizzes, as announced as in the Course Schedule, in which you will show how you have mastered the material of the previous day(s). Quizzes may not be made up, unless students can provide appropriate documentation for their absences (medical or university duty).

Unit Tests

There will be three tests. They will be administered on the dates announced.

Tests will cover the material in individual chapters and will build upon previously discussed material. No unit tests will be made up without a valid medical excuse. You must e-mail me before the exam is administered, or at least right after the test. If you miss a test and are not properly excused, your grade is calculated as 0.

Comprehensive Final Exam

The comprehensive final exam covers all materials studied during the course. The exam consists of a listening comprehension, fill in the blanks, and/or true false portion and a written answer portion. The Final Exam contributes 15% to the final course grade. The Final Exam for this course is scheduled for Saturday, April 30, 2022 from 10:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. Location: TBA

Presentation

You will need to give a short presentation (2-4 minutes) in the German language. You will create PowerPoint slides to accompany your oral presentation. Presentations will be held during the middle of the semester.

Extra Credit

No extra credit assignments are given to individuals that are not offered to the entire class. All extra credit assignments will be offered at the discretion of the instructor.

Late Work

Late submissions will not be accepted unless due to emergency or university approved absence.

Make Up Work/Tests

Students may make up missed tests, quizzes, and essays only with a valid medical or university excuse within one week of the missed quiz, essay or test. If you know you will miss an exam due to an official university function, please make arrangements with your instructor prior to the absence and as soon as possible. If you are absent from an exam, you must present documented proof of illness or university activity to your instructor before an early or make-up exam will be scheduled.

Change of Schedule
