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## **Course Description**

This course will explore the profound impact of World War I and World War II on global history, society, and culture through the unique lens of graphic novels and film. By integrating visual storytelling with traditional academic approaches, students will gain a comprehensive understanding of the complex events, themes, and human experiences during these pivotal periods in the 20th century. This course offers a unique and engaging approach to studying the World Wars, inviting students to explore the depths of history and culture through the captivating mediums of graphic novels and film.

#### Course Objectives

**Historical Context:** Examine the geopolitical, economic, and social factors that led to the outbreak of World War I and World War II, and analyze the lasting consequences of these conflicts on the world stage.

**Literary Analysis:** Explore a curated selection of graphic novels that vividly depict the human stories, struggles, and resilience during wartime. Analyze the narrative techniques, artistic choices, and symbolic elements used by authors and illustrators to convey historical events.

**Film and Graphic Novel as Historical Document:** Investigate how filmmakers and graphic novel writers have interpreted and represented the World Wars on screen and as visual narration. Evaluate the accuracy of historical portrayals, cinematic techniques, and the role of film and graphic novles as a medium for shaping collective memory.

**Cultural Impact:** Examine the cultural and societal changes brought about by the wars, exploring how literature and film serve as powerful reflections of the evolving values, identities, and ideologies of the time.

**Comparative Analysis:** Draw connections and contrasts between different media forms, analyzing how graphic novels and films contribute distinct perspectives to the understanding of wartime experiences.

**Critical Thinking:** Develop critical thinking skills by evaluating primary and secondary sources, challenging historical narratives, and considering multiple viewpoints presented in both graphic novels and film.

**Interdisciplinary Exploration:** Encourage interdisciplinary thinking by integrating historical, literary, and cinematic perspectives to foster a holistic understanding of the World Wars. **Creative Expression:** Encourage students to express their understanding of the material through creative projects, such as analyzing and creating graphic narratives, and critically engaging with wartime films.

## Classwork: Participation and Attendance

Attendance is taken every class meeting. Students are required to be in class for the entire 75-minute period.
