Course Description

This course serves as an introduction to American environmental history. Exploring the mutual influences of man and nature, it will cover issues ranging from deforestation and pollution to conservation and preservation. Some of the key foci will be invasive species, wilderness, national parks, extinction, environmental racism, and eco-tourism.

Exams

*This course includes two exams, a midterm and a final, both of which will consist of six identification terms, two short essays, and one long essay. *Students will upload their exams to a D2L dropbox on the due dates.

Book Reviews

*Students are required to write two book reviews on books from an approved list. Each book review must be 2-3 pages, typed, in 12-point font, Times New Roman and double spaced. Further guidelines are on D2L under "Book Review Instructions." On the due dates, September 22 and November 10, upload your book reviews to the appropriate dropboxes.

Movie Assignment

*Students are expected to write two 5-6-page essays on environmental themed movie from an approved list. Further instructions can be found on our class dashboard on D2L. Click on "Content," and then click on "Movie Assignment Instructions."

*The essay must be typed, in 12-point font, Times New Roman and double spaced. The margins should be 1 inch on the top and bottom and 1.25 on the left and right. Submit your movie assignment via D2L. On our D2L class dashboard, click on "Assessments." Then click on "Assignments." You should see "Movie Assignment #1" and "Movie Assignment #2." You must submit the first by 11:30 P.M. on September 15. You must submit the second by 11:30 P.M. on October 27.

Discussion Leadership

*Each student is expected to lead discussion during one week of the semester. Refer to the guidelines on D2L.

Extra Credit

*No extra credit assignments will be accepted, but bonus points <u>may</u> be offered for attending instructor-specified events on campus.

Make Up Work/Tests

Midterm Progress Report
