Course Overview:

This course is designed to introduce students to global health and give them an understanding of how the global community affects and is affected by changes in economic, political, and social factors. Influences such as education, income levels, governmental policies, regulation of health care provision and transnational economic and political relations will be discussed. The importance of the globalization of disease and wellness and the importance of including all citizens in global health concerns will be deeply discussed.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Describe various factors that contribute to approaches to health care.
- 2. Identify key terms and concepts in global health and wellness.
- 3. Discuss ecological foundations of global health.
- 4. Examine communicable diseases as transnational threats to human health and noncommunicable disease burden on global health.
- 5. Explore inequities in global health.
- 6. Investigate issues related to global health and security and human rights issues.
- 7. Discuss issues related to top down and bottom up promotion of global health.
- 8. Identify his/her role in the global health community.

- All assignments must be written at the baccalaureate level and will be graded for accuracy, completeness, quality, spelling, grammar, and integrity.
- Because of the nature of the assignments, <u>late submissions will not be</u> <u>accepted.</u>

Module 1 – Introduction to Global Health

Students should begin by reading the course notes for an overview of the module and Chapter 1 in the text. There are assigned reading materials found in this module that the student must complete.

• Complete the discussion board (Where do I fit in?) and the quiz for this module.

Module 2 – Key Concepts in Global Health and Ecological Foundations

Students should begin by reading the course notes for an overview of the module and Chapter 2 and 3 in the text.

- Complete the discussion board (Global Disease discussion board) and the quiz for this module.
- Complete the dropbox assignment for foreign country disease burden assessment.

Module 3 – Global Health and Communicable and Non Communicable Diseases

Students should begin by reading the course notes for an overview of the module and Chapters 4 and 5 in the text.

- Download the Behavior Project Word file.
 - Begin this assignment and continue throughout the semester.
- Complete the discussion board (Communicable and Non-Communicable Diseases Discussion Board).

Module 4 – Global Health Inequities

Students should begin by reading the course notes for an overview of the module and Chapter 6 in the text.

- Complete the discussion board (Pick one of the seven questions at the end of chapter 6 and prepare a 300-350 word essay response to that question.
 - Use proper writing style and carefully check your grammar and language use before submitting.
 - Have someone proofread your work if you are at all worried about grammar, spelling, etc. Show the word count for your essay in your name and title of your discussion. *Example:* Discussion board subject: *Mary Jones Question 5 WC 322*)
- Complete the dropbox activity
 - Select a developed and a developing country in the southern hemisphere.

- Collect life expectancy, per capita GDP, government health expenditures per capita, population and demographic estimates for each of the four selected countries.
- Prepare a presentation which
 - Compares and contrasts the data for each country,
 - Explains your operationalization of developed and developing countries in your selection process, and
 - Summarizes the implications for global health based on the data you gathered.

Module 5 – Global Health Security and Human Rights

Students should begin by reading the course notes for an overview of the module and Chapters 7 and 8 in the text.

- Complete the discussion board (Select 1 of the seven discussion questions on p.120 of your text and
 - prepare a 75 to 125-word response and discuss a recent security or human rights event, either global or national and
 - explain what the violation(s) were and what bothered you the most about it),
- Complete the quiz for this module (over Chapter 8 only).

Module 6– Promoting Global Health (This is a large amount of assignments) Students should begin by reading the course notes for an overview of the module and Chapters 9, 10, and 11 in the text.

- Complete the Chapter 9 Dropbox Assignment (Who and Challenges)
- Complete the discussion board 1 (Find a global health organization and describe its mission and global objectives relating to the MDGI)
- Complete the discussion board assignment 2 (group activity) on developing a new health care system.
- Complete the quiz (over chapter 11 only).

Whenever a student is unsure of whether a particular situation will be interpreted as academic dishonesty, he/she should ask the instructor for clarification. If students are guilty of academic dishonesty, a grade of zero (0) may be given for the quiz, assignment, etc. Cases may also be referred to the Dean of Students for possible dismissal from the university.
