**Course Description**

A study of individual, family, and community experiences, incorporating inquiry and research to deepen understanding.

**Course Content and Skills**

1. **Analyze research on** how individual, family, and community experiences shape perspectives and influence human interactions.
2. **Evaluate research of** varying viewpoints by applying course concepts to real-world media, narratives, and case studies.

3. **Develop** critical thinking and inquiry skills to interpret the motivations, values, and societal influences behind varying perspectives.
4. **Reflect** on and interpret research to gain insights into human interaction and relationships.
5. **Synthesize** insights gained from perspective analysis to deepen awareness of the complexities of human experiences and interactions.

### **Textbook & Instructional Materials**

There is no textbook for this course. Online resources, readings, supplementary reading material will be provided within the course.

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### **Study Hours and Tutoring Assistance**

Copying and pasting directly from AI tools or submitting AI-generated content as your own constitutes plagiarism and will not be tolerated. If AI is used, its use must be disclosed within the assignment. Ultimately, academic work should reflect your own thinking and writing.

## **Required Assignments**

### **Autobiography**

To better understand researcher positioning, you will create an Autobiography that explores the sociocultural factors that inform your own positioning.

### **Research Topic Proposal**

Students will choose an issue for their Research Topic Proposal which must be approved by the instructor. This issue will be utilized to complete the Argument Analysis.

### **Argument Analysis**

Select two articles as resources to compile an APA 7<sup>th</sup> edition formatted paper about your selected topic.

### **Field Work**

Collect qualitative data using the template provided. This data will be collected using digital ethnography, in person observation, and/or interviews.

### **Synthesis Paper**

You are to take the data that you gathered from your field notes, along with your autobiography and academic analysis, and synthesize your findings in a 4-5 page APA style paper.

## **Extra Credit**

Extra credit will not be accepted for any assignments.

## **Late Work**

**No late work will be accepted.** Students are expected to be on time with assignments and to complete every assignment. Because all assignments are posted from the beginning of the semester and will be submitted online, "make up" work should not be an issue. Exceptions to this are exceedingly rare and will be considered on a case-by-case basis with proper documentation.

The instructor will assign a grade of either WF or F through the first 8 weeks of a long semester, the first 6 weeks of a 10 week summer term, or the 11th class day of a 4 or 5 week summer term consisting of 20 days. After these periods the grade will be an F. The date the instructor drop form is received in the Office of the Registrar is the official drop date.

## Attendance, Participation, and Assignment Submission

Participation points will be deducted for each absence, as well as failure to participate in class discussions and activities. Students are expected to be on time for class. ## Online Computer Requirements

This class is a hybrid course, meaning it is both face-to-face in the classroom and online. It is your responsibility to have (or have access to) a working computer in this class. ***Assignments and tests are due by the due date and personal computer technical difficulties will not be considered reason for the instructor to allow students extra time to submit assignments, tests, or discussion postings.*** Computers are available on campus in various areas of the buildings as well as the Academic Success Center. **Your computer being down is not an excuse for missing a deadline!** There are many places to access your class! Our online classes can be accessed from any computer in the world which is connected to the internet. Contact your instructor immediately upon having computer trouble. If you have technical difficulties in the course, there is also a student helpdesk available to you. The college cannot work directly on student computers due to both liability and resource limitations; however, they are able to help you get connected to our online services. ## Instructor Class Policies

Candidates are expected to assist in maintaining a classroom environment which is conducive to learning. In order to assure that all candidates have the opportunity to gain from time spent in this class, unless otherwise approved by the instructor, candidates are prohibited from engaging in any form of distraction—this includes, but is not limited to, pagers and cell phones. Electronic communications devices will be turned off anytime the class member is in the

virtual school building or in a field experience. Inappropriate behavior in the virtual classroom shall result, minimally, in a request to leave class and a Professional Fitness Form will be filed for review with the college. If the instructor must file a Fitness Alert Form for any reason, including failure to demonstrate appropriate teaching dispositions, the candidate may receive an instructor drop with an "F" for the course.

### **Change of Schedule**

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

### **Refund and Repayment Policy**

A student who withdraws or is administratively withdrawn from Midwestern State University (MSU) may be eligible to receive a refund for all or a portion of the tuition, fees and room/board charges that were paid to MSU for the semester. HOWEVER, if the student received financial aid (federal/state/institutional grants, loans and/or scholarships), all or a portion of the refund may be returned to the financial aid programs. As described below, two formulas (federal and state) exist in determining the amount of the refund. (Examples of each refund calculation will be made available upon request).

### **Inclement Weather**

In the case of campus closure due to inclement weather, this class will follow the university's directive. If the campus is closed, class will be canceled. If the campus has a delayed start time that is **past** the class start time, class will be canceled for that day. **Be sure you have the MSU Alert app downloaded and also check the university's website for up-to-date information regarding campus closures and delays.**
