MUSC 3311 – Jazz Improvisation Dr. Sarah Dunbar

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Prerequisites.

MUSC 1603 and MUSC 2623, Theory I & II.
MUSC 1601 & MUSC 2621, Ear Training & Sight Singing I & II.

Course Description. This course is designed to assist with the development of music improvisation skills as related to the jazz style of music. The purpose of the course is to further student ability to improvise freely by studying and performing basic elements of jazz improvisation. Students will develop knowledge and performance ability of jazz articulation and phrasing, idiomatic melodic patterns and phrases, and notable compositions from standard jazz repertoire. Students may repeat for credit.

Course Objectives.

- 1. To improve the ability to improvise in a jazz style
- 2. To improve the ability to play or sing jazz lines and rhythms
- 3. To improve the ability to transcribe music (write music from a recording or performance)

Required Materials.

- 1. Instrument in working condition (must bring to class every day)
- 2. "iReal Pro" Music Practice App (download on iPhone, Android, or Mac)

Homework. All homework will be due at the beginning of class on the date specified. Some homework will consist of written assignments or worksheets, other homework assignments will consist of music to practice and perform in class. Late work will not be accepted. The schedule of assignments and due dates is on the last page.

Quizzes. Quizzes will consist of written responses and/or playing. There will be four quizzes. Quizzes will be completed during class time.

Midterm Exam. Your midterm exam will consist of a performance of a transcribed solo. You must transcribe the solo yourself, learn it, and perform it with the original recording, matching pitches, rhythms, articulation, tone, and style. You may choose your own solo to transcribe, however, it must be approved in advance by the instructor.

Final Exam. Your final exam will consist of a written exam and an improvised performance with a backing track. For the performance portion, you will be given three new tunes to prepare in advance, and one will be randomly selected during the final exam. You will be expected to perform the melody followed by two choruses of an improvised solo.

Attendance Policy. Students are expected to attend every class prepared and ready to play. Students will not be permitted to make up homework, quizzes, or exams from days they missed due to an unexcused absence, or from days in which they came unprepared. Students must notify the instructor as far in advance as possible to make up work for an excused absence.
