COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of leadership in sport including a review of philosophical foundations, theoretical foundations, and best practices.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Sudents will discuss the difference between leadership and management.
- 2. Students will discuss the difference between being a leader as opposed to being a manager.
- 3. Students will demonstrate an understanding of why success is dependent upon the ability of an individual to be both a leader and a manager.
- 4. Students will identify the primary characteristics of various leadership styles and how these leadership styles are exemplified in a sport context.
- 5. Students will determine their dominant decision-making style and identify and discuss their strengths and weaknesses as a decision-maker in their work environment.
- 6. Students will review and summarize the current literature associated with a common leadership responsibility such as fostering innovation, resolving conflict, designing an organizational identity, constructing narratives to engage targeted audiences, or developing public support for an organization.
- 7. Students will undertake an in-depth study of a current leader in sport.

LEARNING ACTIVITIES AND ASSESSMENT

Class Assignments

Assignment 1: Flipgrid Introduction (40 points) Due: October 18th

Introduce yourself to the class. Tell us some information about you, what year you are in, and what you would like to do with your degree. Tell us a few fun facts about yourself. Respond to **four** peers with the three comments and one **qust**on Please share at least 2 minutes worth.

Assignment 2: Take the Personality Profile (100 points) October 23rd

Take the personality profile that is loaded below. Print them off and fill in the first page with the strengths and weaknesses then transfer the matching words to the scoring sheet. Determine the type of personality you are, Sanguine, Melancholy, Choleric, or Phlegmatic, and watch the presentation I have uploaded to D2L. There are definition worksheets to help

with word terminology. Write an in-depth paper explaining the type of personality you have and how you see your personality temperament affect your leadership style. Give quality examples of how you were influenced throughout your life by your temperament. Have a minimum of three clear examples of leadership opportunities that were influenced by your temperament. Have a title page and use APA formatting. Double space. If you research your personality type include that in the reference page and in-text citations.

YouTube is the final thing to watch and listen to after you have determined your leadership style. You will use this assignment in the next assignment write-up.

Upload your scoring sheet into D2l with your personality type.

Assignment 3: Flipgrid (100 pts) Houston Astro Cheating-Leadership Due October 30th

Analyze the Astros cheating scandal from the perspective of leadership. Do a brief summary of what actually occurred. Through Flipgrid discuss the successes and failures of the leadership. Be sure to specify how the crisis unfolded, how quickly and in what ways the sports organization responded to the crisis, and what crisis response strategies appear to have been employed. Then clearly articulate what steps you would have taken as the leaders within the organization.

If you were in leadership, how would you have handled this differently.

Create a 6–10-minute Flipgrid explaining what as a leader you would do differently or the same. Comment on at least three peers.

Assignment 4: minimum 3--page single-spaced paper: Transformational, Transactional, and Servant Leader and san back and sand servant Leader and sand page single-spaced paper: Transformational, Due: November 6th Describe the most significant difference between transformational, transactional, and servant leadership in detail and examples. Then do a Flipgrid describing the leadership style of a coach you admire. What do they do that demonstrates that leadership style and what is it about them you admire? Be clear and use quality examples to identify his or her personality type. 2 outside resources. APA formatting, in-text citations and reference page.

Assignment 5: Flipgrid (8-10 minutes) & PowerPoint on Strategic Leadership (100 points) Due: November 13th

Inchapter 7 strategic leaders are discussed in detail. Create a Power Point to discuss what a strategic leader is and their strengths and weaknesses. Which characteristics do you think are most important in the sports industry in the $21^{\rm St}$ century and why? Be detailed and give examples. Give a presentation of your Power Point on Flipgrid. Do not read it, be familiar enough to give a good presentation. 7-9 minutes. Use 2 outside resources. APA formatting. In-text citation and reference page. Post quality feedback to 2 peers using the 3C's and 1 Q.

Assignment 6 Staley & Legette-Jack Offers Hope (100 pts) November 20th

Please see the attachment in D2l for assignment directions. Provide a 3-page in-depth analysis, double-spaced based on the questions provided. Use APA formatting, two outside sources besides the book and Chapter 13 and in-text citations.

Assignment 7 Groupthink (100 pts) Due November 27th

Create an 8-10-minutes Flipgrid on what Groupthink is and give examples where Groupthink is used in sports and one in history. Is it a positive concept or not, and why or why not? You will need to research this outside the book, as the example in the book cannot be used. Upload one peer-reviewed article to Flipgrid on the screen just before you submit it. Where it says link, type in the URL code. Make sure you have 3 C's and 1 Q for four of your peers. Upload a minimum of 2 peer review articles into D21.

Assignment 8: Flipgrid (6-8 minutes) on your leadership style (100 points) Due: December 2nd Now that you have read most if not all of the book, looking and discovering the different types of leadership styles, which one best fit you? Why? The books cover many other types of leadership styles than the specific ones we covered, make sure your research includes all leadership styles when choosing your personal style. Give examples of your leadership style at work and in professional relationships. How do you think this style makes you a good leader? What are your strengths and weaknesses? How can you address your weaknesses? Post quality feedback to **2 peers using the 3C's and 1 Q.**
