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Course Description

The focus of this lecture course is to introduce students to leadership theories in healthcare. This course provides a foundation for future healthcare leaders. Students are exposed to a series of alternative leadership perspectives, including collaborative models. Topics include: defining leadership, interdisciplinary and interprofessional working, communication and leadership, and leadership for change.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Define Leadership.
- 2. Recognize the importance of clinical leaders in clinical practice.
- 3. Analyze and compare leadership theories.
- 4. Define concepts of interdisciplinary leadership teams.
- 5. Identify one's own strengths and weaknesses as a leader or future leader.
- 6. Apply theoretical leadership concepts and prepare solutions in the healthcare setting.

There is no required text for this course.

Presentations

Course presentations will be assigned throughout the semester to ensure mastery of the material. Specific requirements will be covered in class as well as posted in D2L. Please not that this portion of the course is worth 20% of your overall grade.

Mock Interviews

In an effort to assist the student in preparation for the interview and employment process, the student will be required to complete a resume and mock interview as part of this class. A professional resume will be due March 14, 2019 via drop box on D2L. Mock interviews are tentatively scheduled for April 11, 2019. These interviews will include Respiratory Therapy Directors, Managers, and/or Educators as well as one faculty member. Interviews will be scored based upon the rubric provided with emphasis on professionalism, preparation and attitude. Following completion of the Mock Employment Interview, each student is required to complete a reflective report discussing the experience, pros and cons as well as suggestions for improvement. The Reflective Report is required to be one page in length, 12 font, double-spaced and well written. This report will be submitted via drop box on D2L no later than April 16, 2019. Please not that this portion of the course is worth 30% of your overall grade.

Leadership Interview

You will be required to evaluate leadership development from the perspective of a leader serving in our professional organizations. Your leader and their contact information will be assigned. You will be required to submit a presentation of your liking that encompasses the findings from your interview. You will be required to ask and have responses to a minimum of five questions. You need to include a summary that explains the overall experience of the interview along with the things that you learned during the interview process. The Interview Project is to be presented in class on April 29, 2019. Please not that this portion of the course is worth 20% of your overall grade.

Online Assignments

On occasion, this class will require online participation according to the course schedule. Your attendance will be based on your participation in the online portions of this course. Class participation is an integral part of this course. You are expected to participate actively in and contribute to the learning experience in this course. Participation means providing substantive comments, questions and contributions that advance the learning process for you and/or other learners in the course. Participation may include responding to questions and issues posed by other learners. Non-substantive comments, irrelevant comments and comments of the nature of "I agree" or "I disagree" do not count. Please not that this portion of the course is worth 30% of your overall grade.
