Math 0003: Beginning Algebra, Fall 2024

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Course Description

This course is designed to teach students topics in elementary algebra which will prepare them for College Algebra/Intermediate Algebra. Students must earn a "C" or better in this course to advance to 1233 College Algebra/Intermediate Algebra.

Textbook & Instructional Materials

Required digital materials for this course are part of the Courseware Access and Affordability Program at MSU Texas. Students are charged for required course materials on their student account with the Business Office. Any students who wish to opt-out of the Program and purchase the required course materials on their own must follow the Opt-out instructions sent to students' official my.msutexas.edu email address after the first day of class. Please contact the MSU Bookstore if you have any questions about the opt-out process. When using MyLab for the first time, you may need to run a browser check and download necessary plug-ins.

Calculators

You should have a calculator that will add, subtract, multiply, divide and perform exponentiation. You will not need a graphing calculator, though you are welcome to use one. You are expected to bring your calculator to class each day.

You may not use a phone or any device with internet access as a calculator. You may not share calculators.

Grading: Your grade will be computed as a sum of

<u>Grade Distribution</u> The grade distribution will be no stricter than the following:

<u>Homework</u>: The online homework for this course is via MyLab Math, which you can access through a link in D2L. Homework will be assigned using the MyLab system. Problems may be worked as many times as you like, so a perfect homework score should be attainable. Homework for each chapter will be due for 100% credit at regular intervals; you are encouraged to work on homework after each class period. Your lowest four homework scores will be dropped and the remaining scores will be averaged to determine your homework grade for the course. The assigned problems represent a minimum number of problems to be worked. You are strongly encouraged to work additional problems.

<u>Attendance</u>: This class will meet in its regularly scheduled room all scheduled days. You are expected to attend every class. This includes arriving on time, staying until the end, and being prepared and engaged. If you must miss class, it is your responsibility to talk to a classmate to find out what you missed. Excessive and repeated absences (< 4) may result in an automatic drop with an F in the course.

Late Arrivals and Disruptions: Any late arrival to class may be counted as an absence at the instructor's discretion. Students who need to leave class prior to the dismissal of class should speak to the instructor beforehand in order to not incur an absence. It is disruptive to the classroom environment for students to leave class for personal reasons and then return to the classroom. It is the policy of the University that dependent children not be cared for in campus offices and classrooms. Students should turn off all cellular devices during class.

Exams: Exams are in person, and require a calculator (not a cellular device). If a test is missed, it is generally not possible to take a make-up test. It is the student's responsibility to communicate with the instructor immediately and preferably before the test. A make-up test may be given, per the instructor's discretion, otherwise, a grade of "0" will be recorded. The final exam (scaled appropriately) can be used to replace the lowest test grade. The final exam is mandatory for all students in Developmental Mathematics courses. Failure to take the exam will result in an exam grade of "0"; there is no make-up final exam. The Final Exam is determined by the final exam schedule.

Assignments are due by the due date, and personal computer technical difficulties will generally not be considered reason for the instructor to allow students extra time to submit assignments. Computers are available on campus in various areas of the buildings as well as the Academic Success Center. Your computer being down is not an excuse for missing a deadline! There are many places to access your homework! Our online homework can be accessed from any computer in the world which is connected to the internet. If you have technical difficulties with the website, there is also a student tech support from Pearson available to you.
